### NO HARM FROM THE DEAD.

"For myself," remarked a leading member of the medical profession here, "it would not shock me at all to know that my skeleton, wrapped and strung with wires, is to be hung up in the laboratory of Jefferson Medical College. The skeleton of Dr. Warren, the celebrated surgeon of Boston, is hanging in the laboratory of Harvard to-day, but is not shown to strangers out of respect for his family. This was done at his own request. But there has been a great deal of exaggeration in what has been written and said about the pollution of water and air by the bodies of the dead. Earth is a great deodorizer, and when bodies are placed in it they gradually decompose and all septic and poisonous matters are removed. Of a human body weighing 160 pounds, seventy five are water and ten pounds bone, leaving less than twenty pounds as a source of disease. Take in account the vast amount of water in the Schuylkill, and the distance that any poisonous matter has to percolate through, the soil to reach it, it seems folly to assert that it would affect the water we drink. If a torrent of water should rush through Laurel Hill Cemetery in contact with the bodies there the stream would purify itself in a quarter of a mile. And then there is another foolish idea that people indulge in that worms eat the human body. They do not, but live on vegetable substances. The bodies of dead animals and human beings gradually resolve themselves into their constituent elements. An animal drops dead out on the plains. Birds of prey and jackals pick its bones and they in time crumble into dust. "So with the human body. The slow process of combustion goes on in the grave, but it is out of sight. The gases that escape are seized upon by other forms of life. We are dust, and what is the death of one is the life of another. But it would be very different if a dead body were lying in a strain and the exhalations came up into the houses. In London the subject is attracting a great deal of attention, the burial places of the dead occupying an enormous amount of room. There they are awaiting legal enactment to compel cremation. The arguments used there are the economy of space for sanitary reasons. In London, where the death rate is one person per minute, it is becoming a serious question where they shall place their dead. As an instance that gases from the bodies of the dead do not affect the living I will mention the Church of the Capuchins at Rome. The body of a monk when he dies is placed in the earth below the church until it decays. It is then exhumed and placed against the walls of the vault. The survivors who live over this charnel house are not affected by exhalations or gases producing disease."—Philadelphia Times.

## WRESTLING Tournament.

**Mr. JOHN BASTIAN,** Of this city, is making arrangements for a Grand ENGLISH AND CORNISH Wrestling Tournament, To be held at WASHINGTON SQUARE, On the 5th, 7th and 8th of July.

This Tournament is free for all Wrestlers in English and Cornish style, the entries being limited to forty-eight participants. The wrestling must be done in loose jackets, which will be furnished when necessary, catching the belt, or below the belt, being a foul. Three points constitute a fall, that is, two shoulders and one pin, or two pins and one shoulder, the falls to be decided by three judges appointed by the Proprietor, the records of the wrestling to be kept by a committee of four, the Tournament to be further subject to the usual rules governing English and Cornish Wrestling Matches, to be produced at the time of the exhibition. The prizes amount in all to \$410, to be divided as follows: FIRST PRIZE, \$150; SECOND, \$100; THIRD, \$75; FOURTH, \$50; FIFTH, \$25 and SIXTH, \$10, the money to cover the same being now on deposit in one of the banks.

This is a new and novel entertainment for this place, and one which has never failed to bring liberal patronage and enthusiastic attendance, at other places where such tournaments have been held. Everything thus far promises for the tournament a grand success. It is expected that wrestlers will take part in the tournament, and patrons of this sport will be present from Idaho, Montana, Colorado, Nevada and California.
