MAN AND WOMAN.

No one has expressed better than Tennyson the distinctive nature of man and woman:

For woman is not undeveloped man, But diverse; could we make her as the man, Sweet love were slain; his dearest bond is this.

Not like to like, but like in difference. Yet in the long years liker must they grow.

The man be more of woman, she of man; He gain in sweetness and in moral height.

Nor lose the wrestling thews that throw the world; She mental breadth, nor fall in childhood care.

Nor lose the childlike in the larger mind; Until at last she set herself to man, Like perfect music unto noble words.

The general characteristics of man and woman are here set forth, and they are in accordance with a true philosophy of their physical, moral, and mental constitution.

The prominent feature of man is strength, and of woman beauty. It has been no artificial division of labor which has made the multitudes of men warriors, sailors, laborers in the field and the workshop, and the multitudes of women laborers in the house.

The first step in civilization is taken when woman begins to sit at the loom at home, and to make coverings of tapestry, and the linen—when she adorns and beautifies the savage life of man.
