PLEASANT GROVE NOTES. Quite a number of people from Pleasant Grove are moving to Ashley's Fork, Utah county, with a view of settling permanently in that county. About twenty wagons, with complete outfits, loaded with human freight (live, course), passed through Pleasant Grove on Saturday en route for Arizona. The emigrants were from the vicinity of Ogden and South Jordan, Utah. Wm. W. JACKSON, of American Fork, has erected a fine store opposite James Chipman's, and has filled the place with a full line of men's and boys' clothing. Mr. Jackson is a tailor by profession, and intends manufacturing in the same house. LUMBER men and mill owners operating in American Fork Canyon are down in the mouth. The present season has been unusually bad; with high waters and the shortness of the term they will hardly make expenses. The price of lumber is not commensurate with the cost of manufacturing the article. Altogether the industry is not as profitable as in past years. A large percentage of the mills in the Territory have stood idle this summer from the above causes. "An outrage" is the way a pronounced "Liberal" expresses himself over the idea of appointing C. H. The New York Stock Market.

New York, October 6.—Stocks made an active showing and were buoyant with a well distributed business. The prices show an advance of 3/4 to 1 1/2, as compared with Saturday's closing. Louisville and Nashville scored the greatest improvement, advancing to 30; Pacific Mail rose to 63 1/2 on the statements that the Central Pacific and Hong Kong line be withdrawn. This gives the Pacific Mail a monopoly of the Chinese business. After 11 there was a slight reaction in the market but at the present time, speculation is strong again. New York, October 6.—Governments steady, railways slightly lower for speculation issues. Stocks at times to-day were characterized by activity and buoyancy. Dealings were well distributed. Union Pacific advanced as on a favorable statement of operations of the company for August, which show a decrease of only \$47,000 in the gross reduction of the operating expenses, \$275,000, and a gain in the net earnings of \$228,000. Land sales of company, Nebraska division, for September, were 1,224,000 acres for \$772,000, and from January 1st to October 1st 4,939,000 for \$3,221,000. The report that the Central Pacific intended to withdraw its Hong Kong line, had a good effect on Pacific Mail, Central Pacific higher on a semi-official statement of the company's business improving. Compared with last Saturday's closing, prices are 1/4 to 2 1/2 higher, except Missouri Pacific, which is 1/4 lower.

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
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
