OUR INTERNAL COMMERCE.

The Laborers Still in Session—Blaine's Ohio Blow-Out—Big Fire.

Four Wayne, Ind., October 10.—Chas. W. Butler, one of the most noted criminals in the State of Ohio, a son of Dr. George Butler, a wealthy physician of Columbus, O., was executed at Columbus City, Ind., today for the murder of Abbie Butler, his young wife, at Pierceton, Ind., on September 23d, 1883.

Our Internal Commerce.

WASHINGTON, October 10.—The matter of chief importance treated in the annual report of Mr. Nimmo, of the bureau of statistics, is of enormous magnitude. Our internal commerce has shown the value of the products of the various industries of the United States is seven times the total value of our foreign commerce, nearly three times the total value of the foreign commerce of Great Britain and Ireland, and five times the total value of the foreign commerce of France, including, in each case, both imports and exports.

The Laborers.

CHICAGO, October 10.—The federation of trades and labor unions continued the discussion this morning of various planks in their declaration of principles without arriving at any result. Certain of the delegates endeavored to introduce matters affecting national politics, but were generally thwarted.

Big Fire.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 10.—Parita, Peru, via Galveston.—A fire last night destroyed a quarter of the town. It started at 9 o'clock, and at 4 this morning the flames, fanned by a strong south wind, consumed everything in a straight line from where they originated, down to the beach.

A Den Discovered.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., October 10.—In demolishing an old building on the top of East Rock, the workmen discovered several underground passages of 30 or 40 inches, 15 feet high, 3 feet wide, which led to a subterranean vault. Several counterfeit silver pieces and a broken die were found.

Arrested for Stealing.

TORONTO, October 10.—B. Osterhant, a divinity student of Victoria College, Cobourg, is arrested on a charge of stealing a thousand dollar Canadian Pacific bond from the Alloway & Champion private banking office at Winnipeg, while there a short time ago purchasing land for his brother.

Land Office Report.

WASHINGTON, October 10.—The Commissioner of the general land office has submitted a report of the operations for the fiscal year ended June 30th, 1884. The sales, entries and selections of public land embraced 24,831,041 acres; Indian lands, 67,129 acres; total, 27,501,170 acres, an increase over the year 1883 of 13,222,003 acres.

Blaine's Show in Ohio.

CHILLICOTHE, Ohio, October 10.—Mr. Blaine left Columbus by special train on the Scioto Valley road, at 10 o'clock this morning. Ex-Governor Foster joined the party. The first stop was at Circleville, where there was a large gathering in front of the court house.

HENDRICKS.

Is Heartily Received in Cincinnati.

HE MAKES A LITTLE SPEECH.

With Which Republicans May Not Agree—Reference to Polygamy—Cheers.

CINCINNATI, October 10.—Ex-Senator Hendricks reached here to-day and was driven to a hotel without any parade or escort. In the afternoon he took a drive through the suburbs and received calls, but made no address. Senator Bayard of Delaware, Judge Thurman and General Rosecrans are also in the city to attend a meeting at night.

Portsmouth, Ohio, October 10.

The reception at Chillicothe was elaborate and artistic. The approach to the stand was through an avenue between parallel lines of uniformed horsemen. At the upper end of this avenue were two rows of girls dressed in white, representing the states of the Union and holding up a series of green arches beneath which Blaine passed upon the stand, where were three smaller girls, representing Maine, Vermont and Ohio.

Crop Reports.

WASHINGTON, October 10.—October returns.—Corn, average higher condition than in the past five years, but not so high as in any of the remarkable corn years from 1875 to 1879, inclusive. The general average is 98, which is very nearly an average of any series in ten years, and the indications are about twenty-six bushels per acre. Cultivation approximating 70,000,000 acres.

Kentucky Pastime.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., October 10.—Courier-Journal.—A Barltown, Kentucky special, says information is received of the killing of Blum Funk by Dr. T. Williams in Washington County. Williams had Funk discharged from the revenue service for non-payment of a bill. Funk met Williams on the road and seized his horse's bridle; Williams drew a pistol and fired, killing him instantly.
