

DROPPED DEAD.

The Sudden Death of Schnyler Colfax.

ST. JOHN AND HIS WORK.

Papal Congratulations—Bank Failure—Carver's Work—France and China.

Earthquake.

MADRID, January 13.—Alhambra was visited again yesterday by a severe earthquake shock, just as King Alfonso and suit were leaving the city. No damage was caused. The shocks were felt as far as Algarraba, where the people were panic-stricken. A serious calamity occurred at Nerja, an encampment of refugees on the outskirts of town. The burned and unfortunate people who were thus made shelterless, were exposed to a heavy snow storm, which prevailed throughout Granada.

Papal Congratulations.

BALTIMORE, January 13.—A special from Rome to the Sun says: The Pope is now engaged preparing a special letter in which he will congratulate Archbishop Gibbons, as well as all bishops recently assembled in Baltimore in the plenary council upon the issue of the deliberations, and upon the harmony and unity with which the conclusions of the council were reached. It is generally believed that Archbishop Gibbons will be created a cardinal in May next.

Carver's Work.

HARTFORD, Conn., January 13.—Doctor Carver stopped shooting at 1.03 and retired for the night with a total of 11.08 hits to his credit in an attempt to break 60,000 wooden balls in six days. He will begin to-morrow at 8 a. m. His left wrist which has been troubling him, is better. At 1.45 p. m. Carver's score was, shots 16,900; hits 13,875; misses 2,125. The impression is growing that he will not succeed.

Schnyler Colfax Drops Dead.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., January 13.—Vice-President Schnyler Colfax dropped dead in the Omaha depot at Menkaoto, at 10.20 this forenoon. He arrived over the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway, and walked over to the Omaha depot. He took off his overcoat, sat down, and almost immediately fell over and expired. His death is supposed to have been caused by heart disease.

Extradition.

LONDON, January 13.—The judge at the New street police court to-day, granted the extradition to America of William Rouschee, second mate, and P. Koelbin, boatswain of the American ship T. E. Osprey, on the charge of having killed a seaman named Jensen, by cruel treatment during a voyage of the vessel from San Francisco to Liverpool.

Died.

New York, January 13.—Robert Brewster, state register, shot in an affray at Mascot, died at 2 o'clock this morning. Brewster was a native of Ireland, aged 44. He had been a prominent politician in this city many years and formerly criminal sheriff.

Bank Failure.

WARRENTON, W. Va., January 13.—The sudden death of R. F. Payne, active partner in the firm of Payne & Co., bankers, in Warrenton, made necessary an assignment of their assets and the announcement to this effect was made to-day. No preferences.

The California Senatorship.

SACRAMENTO, January 13.—The State Senate, after eleven ineffectual ballots for speaker pro tem, adjourned until to-morrow. This defers the election of United States Senator until January 27.

Indian Lands.

WASHINGTON, January 13.—All the testimony before the Senate committee on Indian affairs to-day, was to the effect that improper means were used to secure leases of Indian lands.

More Sensational Matter Coming Out.

St. Louis, January 13.—The Globe-Democrat will to-morrow publish a long interview with J. S. Clarkson, member of the Republican National committee, who was in this city on Sunday last, in connection with the charge which has been made against St. John. The interview is very long, and refers to various conversations had by Clarkson with James L. Legate, of Kansas, and the conference had between Clarkson, Legate and R. C. Kerens, of St. Louis, who had been sent out from New York by the National Republican committee to aid or advise with Clarkson in his latter's negotiations with Legate. It also embraces two or three dispatches of some significance in connection with the matter, a part of little by themselves. In addition to the letter from Legate to Kerens, telegraphed last night, the following letter is the most interesting document, which bears a signature that the interview contains:

TOPEKA, Ks., Oct. 14, 1884.

Mr. J. S. Clarkson: Sir: When the election is over read this, then do as you see fit about the matter. I saw the importance of controlling measurably the prohibition vote for Republicans, and when talked to by St. John I lent an attentive ear. At Senator P's request I came to see you at Cincinnati. You seemed to share my views, and read me your talk. I awaited the arrival from New York, and supposed the matter would be closed up, but after the consultation at Columbus it was deemed wiser that I should look after St. John, and get him at Cincinnati, having previously agreed with him to go to Michigan with a sore throat. I telegraphed him and made him a specific promise for him to go with him to Pittsburgh, expecting to find some word there, but failed. I said to him, based upon what you had said and your friend from New York together, with what was said by Senator P. the night after the conference at Columbus, that I would guarantee \$10,000. He was satisfied and went with me to Philadelphia. I there persuaded him to write a letter to D. W. Gage, the State organizer for Ohio. A. L. Corey, of Samantha, Rev. R. Geagan, Columbus, and Prof. W. G. Frost, at Oberlin, urging them to aid the Republican State ticket, saying that if the Republican State ticket was elected he believed that his vote in November would be largely increased. My judgment is that his leaving the State and writing these letters added a very large number to the Republican majority in Ohio. At Philadelphia I received a dispatch that the matter would be fixed at New York where with him I went. I found Mr. Elkins, who seemed to know nothing and would do nothing. It did look as though we had been fooled. It placed me in a position where I would not have been placed for a much larger amount. Whatever St. John has done since, we got the benefit of his absence, and the use of his friend, that is affirmatively, in Ohio, and that under my promise. For the sake of a good faith to him, as well as the rest of the future, if Mr. Elkins is elected as I hope he will be, I want you before you close the committee work, to be enabled to make good my promise made under the circumstances, the party having profited by its result. It is a promise I made and guaranteed that it should be fulfilled and it shall be if I am compelled to sell the house that shelters my wife and children. Everybody here is anxious about New York and at Major Smithson's request I have telegraphed. It is as I supposed too late to accomplish good, but is not too late to make good a promise. At your leisure let me hear from you. Yours truly,

(Signed), JAS. F. LEGATE.

To this letter Mr. Clarkson says he made no reply, as he had at no time made any promise to pay St. John any money. Mr. Kerens was also briefly interviewed, and corroborated Mr. Clarkson's statements so far as he knew the facts and circumstances in the case.

LEAVENWORTH, Ks., January 13.—Fred W. Willard, of the Times, this city, a nephew of James P. Legate, publishes a card this morning in which he says that at Mr. Legate's request he wrote and mailed a letter to Chairman Elkins, of the Republican National committee, before the election, saying in substance that St. John would leave the field if it were made an object for him to do so, and that Mr. Legate was the only one who could manage him. Legate received a reply, but Willard did not know its contents. Soon after, Willard, at Legate's instance, sent a telegram to St. John in New York State, the wording of which he did not fully comprehend, but it was sufficient to convince him that Legate telegraphed St. John for instructions. Afterwards, when he asked Legate if he had heard from the dispatch, the latter replied that everything was lovely.

France and China.

PARIS, January 13.—France has chartered two more steamers for use in transporting reinforcements to Tonquin.

BEIJING, January 13.—The Chinese legation denies that German officers are being enrolled for the Chinese army.
