NAGARA FALLS.

Edward Stevenson's Impression of Them.

THE WONDERS OF THE WORLD.

A Descriptive Letter, Written from Personal Observation While on a Visit to Canada.

SALT LAKE CITY, January 15, 1895.

To the Editor of THE HERALD: On my way from Canada to New York, June 10, 1893, via the Canada Grand Trunk Railroad, I was safely conveyed to Niagara Falls, where I availed myself once more of viewing one of the grandest scenic views in the world.

We crossed the Niagara river on the old Suspension bridge, which is two hundred feet above the roaring waters that are said to be two hundred and fifty feet deep at this point of the river. My baggage being secured in the custom house, as is invariably the case in passing into or out of Canada, and as we changed cars at this place, I took refreshment and strolled up the river two miles to the Niagara Falls, taking in the sights as I leisurely passed along, which seemed to increase on every hand. One of the grand views was, as I stood on the banks of the raging river, between the new Cantilever bridge and the old Suspension bridge. The latter was constructed in the year 1855, and has a carriage and pedestrian roadway so constructed as to allow of safe passage directly under the railway, and is 822 feet long. It was very remarkable to see a long train of cars passing over this elevated bridge and to see the many passengers eagerly peeping out of the windows, all of them fearful and excited, lest the trembling structure should give way and drop them into the raging waters below them.

But the railroad company are very cautious and very slowly over the bridge giving the more courageous a very good view of the falls and surrounding scenery. Soon the whistles scream. The trouble and fears are over; nerves settle down, and the diary records: "I have safely crossed and viewed the Niagara Falls the wonder and admiration of all beholders." If the traveler is fortunate enough to pass over during the day, after a little parley with the gate keeper of the new and wonderful Cantilever bridge, for the gates on either side are kept closed against visitors, except by permit from the superintendent, the gates were opened to me and I enjoyed a walk over and back; but while I was in the centre of the bridge, a long, heavy and so close that I was determined to know how often the man who stood at the aperture of a long cooper shop rolled down those empty flower barrels in such precision. Thirty seconds by my watch, and I counted six of those barrels following each other. Of course my curiosity must be gratified to learn the cause and effect of this unusual scene. At the entrance of a capacious flouring mill was posted up "No admittance." I next found myself in the office of the concern, and I found a gentleman, who after a short conversation, informed me that that the mill was owned by Shulhoff & Matthews, of Buffalo, N. Y., and that the capacity of the mill was 1,200 barrels of flour per day. It is run by fifty-one pairs of rollers, and eleven pairs of burrs. Only think of about 1,600 bushels of wheat being crushed into flour in one day by a single mill. I obtained permission to pass through this gigantic affair. Everything was concise and orderly, and very interesting to see. Especially the packing department, where the barrels as well as the paper sacks and half sacks were quickly and accurately packed by machinery. From the packing department the barrels and sacks were conveyed upward to the warehouse, the handling of the barrels was done quickly, passing from one to the other, each one exhibiting great skill in disposing of them until they passed the last hands with a twist and rolled on their chime on a curve, through a large doorway, and were taken from the warehouse by other hands and placed on the trains of cars and conveyed to various points of Canada and the United States. Thus from 1,200 to 1,200 barrels (daily) pass down from the tramway and out of the mill, filled and fitted for the supply of the many, and distributed to the needy, but not for charity alone, but to enlarge the already burdened coffers. Thus moves on the world. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever will be, while mortality exists. Being gratified and interested with my visit, I concluded this part of my trip by stepping up above the mill, near the cooper shop and found the motive power, a large canal brought from the lake above the falls, and not only runs this but an abundance of other machinery. A rainfall set in so that I only passed up to Goat Island bridge, viewed fifty small alligators, took a street car to the wharf and glided on to New York.

"On my November visit I walked up the river on the Canada side, where there are some very pretty cottages, with evergreen surroundings, and while opposite the grand mills previously spoken of, there is a sublime waterfall, where is to be seen the result of the waste water from the canal after running the machinery of the mill and other factories, etc. Some of this water passes over and some comes gushing out of the

banks through tunnels some distance below the surface of the banks of walls of the river, rushing down, foaming, some 150 feet into the river and only loses its grandeur by the magnificent view of the Horseshoe Falls just above, so named by the curved form of a horseshoe. This body of water is 3,370 feet wide and about 20 feet thick in the centre, passing over each minute 1,300,000,000 cubic feet of water and taking a leap of 158 feet, which dashes, foaming, and raising clouds of spray and mist, glittering in the rays of a bright sun, creates a magnificent sight. Then turn the eye over to the American side and behold another grand fall of one quarter of a mile wide, sending over these falls 150,000,000 more cubic feet of water falling six feet farther than the Horseshoe falls, 194 feet. Were it not for the law of evaporation, the beholder would be led to the thought, how it would be possible for this vast volume, added to the many great and large amounts of water continuously flowing down, to ever again obtain its former level. The spectator, while gazing on the numerous objects of interest both on the Canadian and American sides of the river, is almost lost in admiration and deep reflections; many anecdotes and incidents of interest might be related to interest many of the young, but for the present I will forbear lest I intrude.
