SAN FRANCISCO, April 9.—European war news created a sharp panic in prices in the Produce Exchange this morning. At midday board, wheat opened 1.42, 5 cents over closing prices last night, dropped to 1.41, rose to 1.42, and finally closed 1.42.

Foreign Markets.

LONDON, April 9.—11.30 a.m.—There is great depression in financial circles here this morning. It is too evident that the leaders of the street now feel that war is certain. Consols, which closed last night at 97 1/2 for both money and account, opened this morning at 97 1/4 for both. Russian securities are about as weak as they well can be, having declined three points since the close last night.

LOXDOX, April 9.—12.30 p.m.—Consols made further heavy declines, and the feeling upon the street is decidedly panicky. Consols are now quoted at 95 for both money and account. Russian securities made a further decline of 3 per cent.

New York Mining Market. New York, April 9.—Mining shares were again very active and showed a remarkable improvement compared with the dullness for so long a time.

Outdoors appear disposed to come in, and there has been a general shaking up throughout the list. Prices were strong and the general tendency was upward, with a steady increasing business. This feeling was brought about by the receipt of continued favorable advices of dealings of Comstock in the California market, all of which were rising. A Panic on 'Change. Chicago, April 9.—There was a panic on 'Change at the opening of this morning, produced by exciting news from London and St. Petersburg, of the fact that fighting had already occurred on the Afghan frontier. Rapid decline in consols indicated a crisis of some character, but the exact nature and real purport of the intelligence was not known to grain traders. They went blindly, however, on general principles, and May wheat which closed last night at 83 rose by stages of 1/4 @ 1/2 cent at a pump to 85 1/2, where the market rested for a moment and then under free offerings and partial subsidence of the scare, prices dropped off nearly 2 cents to 84 1/2, then rose again 8 1/2, and is now quoted at 85 1/2, but with a very fearful feeling still prevailing, and prices fluctuating widely. All other markets took on the same excited tone through in a modified degree.
