

AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

A Farmer's Experience in the Stock Convention.

SALT LAKE CITY, April 7, 1885. To the Editor of THE HERALD. After a great deal of time spent here in talk, a Territorial stock association was completed, and I am glad of it. I saw the communication in THE HERALD on the morning of the 2d. Being a farmer and considering what "Stockmen" said in regard to the sheep interest, I became thoroughly convinced that the farmer and stockmen were not independent of each other, because the stockmen were as well dressed in the convention as any body, and they all had on clothing made up of the wool that grows on the sheep.

MINING DISPUTE.

The Mono, of Tintic, Forcibly Entered.

From a gentleman in the city yesterday from Tintic a HERALD reporter learned of a somewhat serious difficulty in that now-prosperous mining district, in which the Eureka Mining Company figured in connection with the seizure of the Mono mine. On Tuesday morning, at 3 o'clock, twelve men in the Eureka Company's employ broke into and took forcible possession of the Mono, driving out the two men, at work on that shift for Mr. James Robbins. This is the second time the Eureka people have tried to secure possession of the Mono. The first time, about three weeks ago, they were barricaded and driven out, although they had the drift full of guns and men; but this time they were successful in obtaining an entrance and driving out Mr. Robbins' representatives.

The circumstance has created quite a commotion in the district, as the general impression prevailed there that the Mono, or, as it was originally called, the Left Bower, was the oldest location. It certainly is a valuable mine, embracing the prospect where the Crismons, in the early days of the camp dug out of what was then styled the "Horn Silver cut," \$72,000 worth of mineral. There is in the Mono to-day a fine body of ore in sight, which appears as if \$100,000 worth a month could be extracted. At present there is ore on the dump which is valued at \$15,000. The claim of the Eureka company is based, we understand, on the fact that the disputed ground is on the side line of the Montana (owned by them) and the Left Bower, or Mono. They are trying to establish a broad vein theory. The starting of the fight with Mr. Robbins has the appearance of a bad omen for the Eureka folks, as when the dispute arose between them and Mr. John Beck, it was claimed that the vein was running west, and in the present move they will have to set up that it runs east, as the Robbins mine is on the east and Beck's on the west of the Eureka property. Of course, suit will be planted immediately, and the vexatious processes of the law must be endured until the courts decide who is entitled to the possession of this valuable mining property.

The outlook for Tintic district is bright. There are in the neighborhood of 400 men engaged in the various mines and prospects. Mr. Beck has a rich showing in the Beck and Bullion from ten to twenty very fine ore chambers, showing bodies of ore estimated to be worth \$500,000. His shipments average seventy-five tons a day, which would be greatly increased were it not that a large quantity is restrained, pending the suit between him and the Eureka Company, which will probably not be decided until the September term of court. The new iron company, which was organized in Provo, have an excellent show, plenty of iron being in the district, and if they can find sale for their fortunes are assured.

PAJAL ACCIDENT.

The following dispatch, received yesterday, tells its own brief, sad story: SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 9. Dan Kennelly and Pat Sullivan were killed by a premature explosion in the Eureka mine, yesterday afternoon. No one knows how it was done, but when the night shift went on they found the two men dead. It is supposed that they were loading a hole when the blast went off, as a part of the powder and the fuse with the cap was found near them. They had put in a four foot hole, and were supposed to be hurrying to load and discharge it before quitting time, and that the Giant powder cartridges got stuck, when, in trying to force it, it exploded. Sullivan is supposed to have been loading, as his arm is shattered. The other man was close at hand, probably preparing the charge and tamping material.
