

THE IMPENDING WAR.

An Intimation of Russia's Intentions.

REAL POINTS OF THE TROUBLE.

Gladstone in the House of Commons—He Creates an Excitement—The Canadian Pacific.

The Impending War.

LONDON, April 21.—A cipher dispatch received from St. Petersburg last night announcing a fresh advance of the Russian forces upon the Afghan country. The dispatch also said there was a rumor current of disturbances among the Northern Hindostans against England.

Excited.

LONDON, April 21.—The lobby was excited over Gladstone's statement in the House of Commons, which is considered to amount to an evacuation of the position. His repeated references to the necessity of holding the troops in the Indian readiness for service when war should break out, indicate that England is in the verge of war.

The Canadian Pacific Strikers.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 21.—Later reports from the scene of the trouble on the Canadian Pacific, states that when the strikers stopped work they made for the beach in masses, closing all the saloons along the road, and compelling all the company's boarding houses to support a strike during the march.

The \$32,500,000 Credit.

LONDON, April 21.—Of the credit of \$32,500,000 for what Mr. Gladstone termed special preparations outside the budget, \$20,000,000 will be devoted to the army and \$12,500,000 will provide for the Indian war.

NEW YORK, April 21.—At 7 this morning the curtains were opened in General Grant's residence. At 8:30, Dr. Douglas left the house. He stated that the General slept through the night without disturbing him even once.

Russia Fortifying Batoum.

LONDON, April 21.—In defiance of her treaty stipulations with England, Turkey and other powers, Russia is strongly fortifying Batoum, on the eastern coast of the Black Sea.

California's Crops.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 21.—The *Call*, to-morrow, will publish a crop report, showing that in the counties of Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys the wheat yield will carry from half to three-quarters of the acre average.

Struck by a Cyclone.

STERLING, KS., April 21.—During a heavy rainstorm, about 2 o'clock this morning, a cyclone struck Sterling, coming from the southwest, demolishing a portion of the Kansas Sugar company's works and unroofing or partially wrecking a number of houses and barns.

A Lignor Question.

OTTAWA, April 21.—In reference to the dispatch from Calgary, stating that some men of the Sixty-fifth battalion had been placed under arrest for stealing liquor from the officers' stores, the question has arisen as to whether all military officers who take liquor with them into the northwest are not liable to prosecution under the prohibitory law now in force there.
