JEFFERSON'S RELIGION.

Views of the Author of the Declaration of Independence on the Life Beyond.

FRANKFORT, Ky., Mar. 18, 1885.—There is probably no one conversant with the history of Thomas Jefferson but who has heard of the various charges brought against his religious doctrines. The following documents, throwing light upon the subject, have never appeared in print but once, and then very few people had an opportunity to read them. They consist of a letter written by Wm. Canby, an eminent member of the Friends' Society, to Thomas Jefferson, and his reply thereto, and will be read with interest as revealing the religious thoughts and feelings of one who has occupied the Presidential chair.

MR. JEFFERSON'S REPLY. "Sir—I have duly received your favor of August 28th, and am sensible of the kind intentions from which it flows, and truly for them—the more so as they would only be the result of a favorable estimation of my public course. During a long life so much devoted to duty as a faithful discharge of the trust confided to me would permit, no object has occurred more to my consideration than our relation with the beings around us, our duties to them and our future prospects. After hearing and reading everything which probably can be suggested concerning them, I have formed the best judgment I could as to the course they prescribe, and in the due observance of that course I have no recollection which give me any remorse. I subsequently preached of your religious views, and in a discourse of such nature and pathos, is said to have exclaimed aloud to his congregation that he did not believe there was a quaker, Presbyterian, Methodist or Baptist in heaven. Having paused to give his audience time to stare and

wonder, he said that in heaven God knew no distinctions, but considered all good men as his children and brethren of the same family. I believe, with the quaker preacher, that those who steadily observe those moral precepts in which all religions concur will never be questioned at the gates of heaven as to the dogmas in which they differ—that on entering there all these are left behind us. The Aristides and Catos, Penns and Tillotsons, Presbyterians and Baptists, will find themselves united in all principles which are in concert with the Supreme Mind. With all the systems of morality, ancient and modern, which have come under my observation, none appear to me so pure as that of Jesus. He who follows this steadily need not, I think, be uneasy, although he can not comprehend the mysteries and subtleties erected on His doctrines by those who, calling themselves His special followers, and favorites, would make Him come into the world to lay snares for all understandings but theirs. The metaphysical heads, usurping the judgment seat of God, denounce as His enemies all who can not perceive the geometrical logic of Euclid in the demonstration of Anthanasius that three are in one and one in three, and yet that three are not one nor the one three. In all essential points, you and I are of the same religion, and I am too old to go into inquiries and charges as to the unessential. Repenting, therefore, my thankfulness for the kind concern you have been so good as to express, I salute you with friendship and brotherly love. THOS. JEFFERSON. Monticello, September 17, 1813."

THE E. T. WILLIAMS KILLING.

Denounced by the Citizens of Soda Springs.

SODA SPRING, Bingham Co., Idaho., May 4th, 1885.

Pursuant to a call, the citizens met at the Schoolhouse, when W. W. Sterrett was called to the chair, and Mr. Hotchkish was chosen secretary. The chairman then stated that the object of the meeting was to correct statements made and published in relation to the killing of E. T. Williams by a son of James W. Baker, of this place, also to correct a rumor going the rounds that the people intended to lynch the murderers; all of which is false. He also read an article in the Bellevue Chronicle, of April 30th. It was moved by Mr. Eastman, that a committee of three be appointed to draft resolutions, to be signed by the people for the press. Moved that Messrs. Horsley, Anderson and Rose be said committee. Carried. The committee returned and presented the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted, without amendment.

Resolved, That we, the undersigned, citizens of Soda Springs, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby declare that a most foul and uncalculated murder has been committed in the killing of E. T. Williams, of this place, on the 28th day of April, 1885, according to the evidence before a coroner's jury. And we hereby wish to correct a statement published in the Bellevue Chronicle, of April 30th, in regard to the same. And also wish to state that Mr. E. T. Williams has always been an energetic and industrious citizen, and always foremost in all public and private enterprises. And we sincerely condole with his family in their sad bereavement and hope that justice will be meted out to the guilty parties. And we further wish to refute the statement in circulation that the perpetrators of the foul deed would have been lynched had they remained at Soda Springs for an examination. All that the citizens of this place ask is that the law be enforced and the guilty parties punished.

THE ALICE.

Statement of Its Condition on April 1st.

The following account of the financial status of the Alice Gold and Silver Mining Company, has been furnished us by B. G. Raybould, secretary. The report embraces the business of the company between January and April 1st, of the present year:

Total receipts, \$296,106.48. DISBURSEMENTS: Cash in hands of Treasurer and Superintendent, Jan. 1, 1885, \$35,466.24; Value of cordwood on hand, January 1, 1885, 22,696.00. Total, \$58,162.24. Total, \$237,944.24. Bills payable: Three months pay to of \$4,166 2/3 acct. Co's notes, 12,500.00; Dividend No. 14, 50,000.00; Cord wood on hand, 11,283.00. Balance, cash in hands of Treasurer and Superintendent, 1,179.44. Total, 74,902.44. Total, \$232,968.72.

The expenditures during this quarter were increased by additions to the machinery. Item of \$21,634.81 was paid on Cornish pump account, the entire cost of which is \$37,118.96. The mills were shut down for nearly half of the month of February to make the change in the pumping system, as they run entirely with the water pumped from the Alice mine. Several thousand dollars were paid during the quarter for two revolving cylindrical dryers, for use at the sixty-stamp mill.

The Cornish pump is running satisfactorily, and has done so since it was started. All the machinery at the mines and mills is in good working order. Superintendent W. E. Hall reports that the mills are doing good work and the mines are producing the usual quantity of ore. The sinking of the Alice shaft from the 700 to the 800-foot level was recently started, and it is expected will reach the 800-foot level and work will be commenced there in the near future. A new hoisting rig, double direct acting engines, size 18x48 inches, will be placed on the property for use of this shaft, during the next quarter.
