New York Dry Goods.

New York, September 8.—The exports of domestic cottons the past week have been 4,000 packages, and for the expired portion of the year the total was 154,045 packages, against 114,150 packages last year, 115,151 packages the same time in 1883, the largest total in any previous year.

New York Stock Market.

New York, September 8.—11 a.m.—Stocks opened 1/2 @ 3/4 lower and ruled irregular. At 11 o'clock the market was quiet and steady.

New York, September 8.—Noon.—The stock market at 12 o'clock was quiet and firm, at fractions above the opening.

New York, September 8.—Government bonds dull.

The stock market was comparatively quiet today, and at times feverish, especially during the first hour. After a small advance in early dealings there was a break of 1/2 to 1 1/2 per cent, and the lowest figures of the day were reached. At the end of the first half hour they became more steady, and the dealings, except an occasional spurt, were light until late in the afternoon, when there was again some show of business, accompanied by an upward movement that was continued until the close of the board.
