Cholera-Riel-Anti-Farnell-Fight to the Finish-To Mormons-Killed his Father.

WASHINGTON, September 28.—The President has appointed W. L. Powell, of Virginia, Indian agent at Nish Bay agency, Washington Territory.

Anti-Farnell.

LONDON, September 28.—O'Donnell, Home Rule member of Parliament for Dungannon, has retired from the canvass in his district. He declares that Par-

nellites have persistently insulted James Carlisle McCann, formerly Home Rule member of Wicklow, but now liberal candidate for Lancaster. John O'Connor Power, member of Parliament for Mayo and himself, Farnellism, O'Donnell claimed, has reduced the popular organization both in Ireland and America, by its schemes for obtaining money, sapped the foundation of self-government by abusing nominees, and fostered deceptive confidence by claiming triumphs in the adoption by Parliament of every worthless Irish measure. O'Donnell was vice-president and honorary secretary of the "Irish Home Rule Confederation of Great Britain."

Fought to a Finish.

St. Louis, September 27.—Information comes here that a most desperate tragedy occurred at the village of Cottonwood, a point in this State, Friday night. Two intoxicated strangers had a dispute and then had a rough and tumble fight over the weight of a ball of cotton, but they were separated by bystanders. Shortly after, however, the men renewed their fight and mutually agreed in order that neither should have an advantage over the other, that they should clasp left hands together and fight only with their right hands. Thus arranged each man with a revolver in his right hand, began the bloody work. Seven shots were exchanged and one of the men fell dead with four bullets in his head and breast, while the other sank to the ground bleeding and dying from two or three desperate wounds.

Riel.

MONTREAL, September 27.—A meeting in behalf of Louis Riel was held this afternoon, when a resolution was passed asking for subscriptions to take an appeal to the Supreme Council. Mr. Fitzpatrick, Riel's counsel, said Riel's insanity plea was of no avail as in the charge of treason no justification was admitted. L. David said to save Riel was to save the French nationality, and he was the best Catholic and was the best Canadian who sacrificed most for the cause of Riel. Orangemen of Ontario, he said, wanted to drive out the French, but they would not be able to do so, for while a century ago they were but 5,000 strong they numbered 2,000,000 to-day.

PHILIPPOPOLIS, September 23.—Prince Alexander has ordered the civil and military authorities on the frontiers of Bulgaria and Macedonia to maintain order in their respective districts. The populace on both sides of the Balkans are very enthusiastic over the union of Bulgaria and Roumelia, and numbers men have offered to enter the volunteer service in support of the union. Ladies are forming a red cross society and making other preparations for the care of the sick and wounded soldiers, in the event of hostilities being commenced.

The patricide was immediately arrested and jailed.

LIGHTNING FLASHES.

The Bulgarian government has purchased the Rostchuck & Varna Railway for \$7,780,000.

A great Socialist meeting was held in London on Sunday, without interference on the part of the authorities.

Strecker Pasha, a German officer, has been appointed chief of staff of the Turkish army corps at Adrianople.

A mob of Cretans and Macedonians, with others, held a demonstration before the king's palace, Athens, on Sunday.

The manager of the Mexican Central Railway is displaying much energy in repairing the sections of track which has been washed out.

Fighting occurred on Friday near Adrianople on Friday, and during the engagement thirty Roumelians were killed and 300 wounded.

The Roumelian and Bulgarian Parliaments have sent telegrams and addresses to the Czar of Russia, entreating him to protect the union.

In a section of country between Midland and Toyat, Texas, a distance of 112 miles and of immense width north and south, one hundred thousand head of cattle are held in quarantine by the New Mexican syndicate, who hold public lands in evasion of the Federal homestead law, several conflicts involving the loss of six lives have taken place within the past two weeks.

Cholera.

MADRID, September 28.—Five hundred and sixty new cases of cholera, and 203 deaths were reported yesterday throughout Spain.

PARIS, September 28.—Reports received to-day from various parts of the Alps, Maritimes, the south easternmost department of France, show that cholera is spreading throughout the district.

ROME, September 28.—Dispatches received to-day, show that cholera is decreasing in Sicily. King Humbert proposes to visit the infected districts there.

LONDON, September 27.—Cholera has appeared at Nice, France, and eight deaths from the disease have already occurred there. The officials, however, assert positively that there is no cholera in the city, fearing that an acknowledgment of the presence of the scourge will have a ruinous effect on business in preventing the usual influx of winter visitors.
