THE STRIKES.

The Situation in Chicago on Saturday.

THE CARPENTERS IN BOSTON.

The Knights Held Responsible—The Carpenters Fix It—A Billiard Ball Strike.

The Strike in Chicago.

Chicago, May 1.—Five hundred striking railroad freight handlers met at the Harrison Street Viaduct near the west side of the Union passenger depot this morning. Speeches were made by two or three leaders, declaring it was the duty of freight handlers on all Chicago roads to enforce their demands now for shorter hours while the workmen in the other departments were doing so, and upon the suggestion of some one in the crowd, the men started for the Wabash freight yards to urge the men employed there to stop work. The crowd, increasing in size as it moved, entered the Wabash yards; the men there at once began quitting work; in a matter of minutes the yards were empty, and the yards of the Lake Shore, New York & Chicago, New Albany & Chicago and Michigan Central roads were nearly all of the men stopped. In the Michigan Central ten men refused to quit work, and the police arriving the crowd was driven from the yard. The freight house men of the Fort Wayne road this morning made a demand for eight hours, and will stop at noon unless it is conceded. The drivers and conductors of the Blue Island Avenue lines of the Western Division Car Company demand a reduction in their trips from seven to six, confining the working day to eleven hours without decrease in pay. The company acceded without parleying. A hundred men employed by the same company on their extension lines, struck for eight hours. The freight handlers on the Milwaukee & St. Paul road stopped work at 10 o'clock, of their own accord. A crowd of three or four hundred men are marching in a body toward the McCormick works on the southwestern outskirts with a red flag at the head of the column. The works are idle today, the men having been given a holiday. All the lumber yards, box factories and planing mills in the city are closed down. The owners will take joint action to-night. The large packing houses at the stock yards are all running and no shut down is expected before Monday. The procession in the lumber yards dissolved at about 1 o'clock, without causing any damage. The lumber owners express anxiety as to the safety of their property and are setting about for a better protection of their yards. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon there was a large gathering of all classes of strikers on Lake Street, near Desplaines, where they are being addressed by labor agitators.

Several mass meetings occurred in the lumber districts this forenoon. The crowd was composed largely of Bohemians and Germans. They were addressed by the hot-headed leaders and finally the crowd resolved itself into a marching column, and headed by a band of music and carrying red flags, proceeded to the McCormick reaper works where some non-union men were working in the yards, and frightened them away. The procession moved west on Blue Island Avenue to Robert Street, where a mass meeting was held on a vacant lot. The crowd grew larger as it moved along, and grew more boisterous. The police kept advised of its movements, but up to noon no trouble had occurred.

Disastrous to Both.

Boston, May 1.—In this city the trades union of carpenters, the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America amalgamated society of carpenters and joiners and plumbers union, 5,000 men in all, have resolved to demand eight hours on Monday and will strike if the demand is refused. The Masters' Building Association, 200 strong, unanimously condemn the action of the workmen, laying the whole blame on labor unions and declaring that the demand cannot be complied with without disaster to business and workmen both, and they will close up business rather than submit to any interference.

The Knights Held Responsible.

Concord, N. H., May 1.—The proprietor of the Woollen Mills in Pancook has made oath that he believes his property is threatened by mob violence, and has notified Selectman Boscawen that he shall hold the town responsible for its protection. Special police have been appointed who will be on duty day and night until the danger has passed and selectmen have notified the officers of the Knights of Labor who ordered the strike in these mills that they will be held answerable in courts for any damage suffered by the town.

The Carpenters Fix It.

St. Louis, May 1.—Several hundred carpenters decided that beginning today they would go to work at eight o'clock in the morning, take an hour for dinner, and quit at five in the afternoon, thus being in service eight hours. No strike is expected to grow out of this action as the bosses have agreed to the proposition, and the men demand pay for but eight hours work.

A Billiard Ball Strike.

Cincinnati, May 1.—Five hundred employees of the furniture manufacturing and 100 employees of the Brunswick & Balke billiard manufacturers are out on a strike in consequence of a refusal to grant ten hours pay for eight hours' work. In other branches of industry, while there is a general feeling in favor of the eight hours a day, nothing has been done towards enforcing the system.
