FINANCE AND MINING.

An Increase in the Ore Shipments Over Last Week.

THE BIG CAMAS COMPANY.

Ore and Bullion Receipts—The Bannock—General Business and Mining Notes of Utah

Business during the week just closed has been from fair to middling. Merchants report collections as being inclined to be slow, but buoy themselves up with the idea that they will soon pick up. Co-op. stock has been inquired for, but no transactions have been recorded, it being held strictly at par, while seekers after that kind of an investment have been unwilling to go above \$8.

Deseret Bank is held at \$237,600 and \$238.

A strong demand for money has sprung up within the past few days, but none has been obtained for less than 1 per cent. per month, or 10 per cent. per annum. The advance in interest is due to the fact that the county authorities have been very diligent in taxing up all the mortgages as found of record, and as usual in all such cases, the borrower pays for it.

There has been some inquiry for real estate from outside parties, and several extensive deals are now trembling in the balance, and are equally liable to fall on either side.

Numerous significant hints of big mining moves were heard yesterday, but they were summed up in the following remark from a well known operator: "Well, what I do know I can't give away to the public, and what I could give to the public you would not care to print—for the reason it would not be of much consequence, and therefore of little interest."

D. & R. G. earnings for the week ending March 12th, were \$540,940, against \$427,747 for the same period in 1886.

The business failures occurring throughout the country during the last seven days, as reported to R. G. Dean & Co., of the Mercantile Agency, Friday, by telegraph, number for the United States 230, and for Canada 52, or a total of 282 failures, as compared with a total of 229 last week, 269 the week previous to the last, and 239 the corresponding week of last year. The increase of 53 failures over last week is mainly attributable to Canada and the British provinces, where the casualties are exceptional, numerous. A considerable increase is also apparent in the Pacific States and in the south. In New York City there was but one failure of importance, the rest being small.

The Big Camas Company.

The Big Camas Mining company an organization composed of business and mining men of Idaho and Utah, filed their articles of incorporation with the District Clerk yesterday. They provide that the corporation shall be known as above, the duration of the existence of the company being placed at fifty years, and the capital stock at \$2,500,000, divided into 100,000 shares of the par value of \$25 each.

The object, business and pursuit of the corporation is, and shall continue to be, to carry on and conduct the business of owning, locating, buying, leasing and otherwise acquiring gold and silver mines in Alturas County and elsewhere in Idaho; to operate smelters and do anything necessary and appropriate by a corporation of that kind.

The amount of stock subscribed and taken by each of the incorporators named below is as follows:

Williams, Isadore Morris and John T. Lynch. W. L. Pickard is president; P. L. Williams, vice-president; and L. H. Farnsworth, secretary and treasurer.

The company purchases and holds the following described mining property, situated in Mineral Hill Mining District, Alturas County, Idaho: Fifteen hundred feet lineal measure by 600 feet in width on the quartz ledge, lode or claim, known and recorded as the Big Camas Mine, and being the same identical ground located and claimed by Mathew H. The purposes of the organization are the locating, owning, purchasing, leasing, patenting, holding and operating mines and mining property, smelting and other works, mills and nulling property for the reduction and separation of ores, together with all such real estate, mill sites and water privileges as may be useful and necessary in working and running the same. The existence is fixed at the customary

fifty years. The capital stock is \$500,000, divided into 100,000 shares, of \$5 each. The officers of the corporation are to be from five to seven directors, who shall choose from their number a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. The board for the first year consists of Philip Pugsley, James W. Pitts, Philip Margetts, Daniel Turngren and Lewis Martin, who are vested with power to increase their number to seven. No person shall be a director who is not a stockholder to the amount of at least 1,000 shares. The board shall be elected annually, on the first Monday in April, after 1887, at the office of the company in Salt Lake City. The stock shall be unassessable for one year after the incorporation.

Bannock.

Another shipment of Bannock bars was received last evening. Just what their value was, however, could not be learned. A couple of hundred shares changed hands during the week, \$14 being the price offered. Reports from the mine say that the heavy fall of snow is rapidly disappearing, and that several spots of bare ground have put in a very welcome appearance. Another report said that \$3.10 was being offered yesterday, but the stock was being held stiff at \$3.

Bullion-Week.

So far but very little as to what the movements of the new company will be has been learned. There is little doubt, however, but that the California syndi-

cate has purchased the property with a view to working it for all it is worth, and will soon commence to boom the bonanza in a proper manner. A rumor on the street has it that a rich strike has recently been made.

A person from Cour d'Alene mines reports: "There will be 60,000 men at work in the Wardner district before January 1, 1888, and that there is more ore in sight at Wardner than ever Virginia City could boast of in its palmyest days.—Tacoma Commerce.

Items from Era.

Weather at Era fine and snow disappearing fast.

A fine body of rich ore, sixteen inches in width, has been struck by lessees in the Park claim, Lava creek.

The snow has disappeared from the Bannock company's ground and men have been put to work taking ore from the surface.

The lower workings of the Bannock mine are looking splendid. The superintendent says there will be 100 men employed at the mine and still this coming summer. Thirty-two men are now working at the mine.—Inter-Idaho.
