THE EPSOM RACES.

Merry Hampton Wins the Derby by Four Lengths.

THE FRENCH CABINET CRISIS.

Quick and Terrible Retribution—The Brewers—No Janger—Worse—The Queen Gone—Etc.

The Derby.

LONDON, May 25.—Vast crowds left London, to-day, for Epsom Downs to witness the great race for the Derby stakes. Four-in-hands were seen in great numbers. Ten of these turnouts left the metropolis alone, while the Prince of Wales, Lord Roseberry, Crown Prince of Denmark and many other persons of distinction were present. The course was slightly heavy. The Baron, the favorite in the betting, was exercised this morning and appeared in grand form. The stables appeared in grand form. The weather in the forenoon was threatening. Merry Hampton was ridden by Watts, The Baron by Canon, and Martley by F. Barrett. The last betting was 11 to 1 against Merry Hampton, 5 to 4 against The Baron, 10 to 1 against Martley, 7 to 1 against Eridspor, 12 to 1 against Aintree, 22 to 1 against Blanchard, 50 to 1 against Grandison, 100 to 1 against Sa-ville, 200 to 1 against Consolida, and 200 to 1 against the Shannon colt.

A capital start was made. Porcelain and the Shannon colt first showing in advance, with Aintree and Eridspor following, and the Baron and Merry Hampton coming next. Porcelain soon dropped back, but the Shannon colt kept the lead. Martley was last. At the mile post Eridspor drew up and ran level with the Shannon colt, and he was joined directly after by Blanchard, Grandison and the Shannon colt, and he gave way for the Shannon colt, and he gave way. Aintree was now at the tail of the string, and Blanchard and Eridspor were three lengths ahead of the Baron and Merry Hampton. On entering the straight, Cannon rode the Baron vigorously, and Blanchard and Eridspor very soon fell back beaten. Merry Hampton then took the lead, with Martley and Aintree heading the others. The Baron ran with gameness, but failed to reach Merry Hampton, who won by four lengths, with Martley two lengths behind the Baron. Aintree finished fourth and Eridspor fifth. The Shannon colt came in last.

The French Trouble.

PARIS, May 25.—Ferry and Baron De Mackaier, leader of the Right in the Chamber of Deputies, visited President Grevy to-day in relation to the recalling of M. Floquet, to form a cabinet. They declared the creation of a Floquet ministry would injure the foreign relations of France. Floquet still continues his negotiations with the apportionists, who persist in their opposition to the retention of Boulanger in the cabinet. Rouvier especially refuses to accept the portfolio of minister of finance if General Boulanger is retained and if he persists in his refusal it may lead to Floquet's abandoning the task of forming a new ministry. LATER.—M. Floquet has refused to form a ministry and it is now proposed to form a Dieler government with General Saussiere as minister of war.

Quick and Terrible Retribution.

ROCKVILLE, Mo., May 25.—Last Tuesday a man called at the Anderson's residence and asked for a glass of water, which was given him by Jennie, daughter of Mr. Anderson. When she came near him he suddenly seized and chloroformed her, and while under the influence she was outraged. Search resulted in the arrest of John Vandenberg. At the preliminary hearing, yesterday, Judge Just announced that the prisoner would be held in \$10,000 bail, when a shot rang out, followed in rapid succession by two more. There was a scamper for the street, and when quiet was restored the prisoner was dead. No one knows who fired the shots, but as two of the Anderson boys were in the courtroom they were put under arrest.

The Brewers.

BALTIMORE, May 25.—The twenty-seventh annual convention of the United States Brewing Association convened this morning. The report of the board of trustees recommending an appropriation of \$5,000 towards defraying the expenses of the Michigan brewers in the fight against prohibition and declaring against high license was read. The report showed that about 350 brewers throughout the country pledged themselves to protect each other during the strikes. The finance committee reported the balance on hand as \$18,000, and the total membership as 818.

No Danger.

LONDON, May 25.—A Berlin dispatch to the Standard says, in an interview to-day Professor Virochow asserted positively that there was absolutely no danger in Crown Prince Frederick William's malady. He said, however, that it would take some time to effect a complete cure.

Berlin, May 25.—The throat of the Crown Prince Frederick William was again examined to-day by physicians who have the case in charge and it was unanimously decided that there would be no necessity for another operation.
