THE NEW YORK VETS.

Preparations Being Made For Their Entertainment.

The Veteran Firemen of New York will reach Ogden next Sunday afternoon at 3.30, and a special train will go up from this city Sunday morning, carrying members of the City Council, Chief Engineer Ottinger, and as many of the old New York Volunteer Fire Department as can be found. They will accompany the veterans to this city, arriving at 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The "Vets" will put in the rest of the day in taking in the sights and on Monday morning at 9 o'clock, the Salt Lake Fire Department, in full uniform, accompanied by Held's Band, will go down to the depot, and set out an escort to the veterans during the parade, which will start at 10 o'clock. The line of march will be along South Temple Street to Main, thence south to Second South, thence east to Second East, thence north to First South, thence west to the Utah & Nevada Depot, where the party will take the train for the lake. After enjoying the bathing at Garfield Beach, the visitors will be the guests of Louis Eppinger, who will provide dinner. On returning, they will prepare for a concert to be given in the theatre in the evening.

The "vets" travel in a special train of palace cars, which are fitted up for eating and sleeping. It is said that they pay Cappa's Band \$17,000 for their services, in addition to which the band gets all that is made from the concerts. The total cost of this excursion will amount to about \$50,000, but the New York Veteran Firemen's Association can easily stand the expense. The association is over 600 strong, and quite a number of the members are wealthy, retired merchants.

It has long been their custom to have an excursion each year, but the present trip is, of course, the most extended ever made.

The visiting "vets" will number about 110. There are quite a number of old New York firemen living in this city and Territory, and Chief Ottinger is anxious to have as many of these accompany him to Ogden on Sunday morning, as possibly do so, and requests that such persons call on him as soon as possible. So far the following have reported to him: Jake Alt, Messrs. Vandergaw and Jessup.
