Colton's Bad Bill—Chat With Congressman Springer—The Outlook Portrayed.

Congress has not yet succeeded in getting down to solid work, but a few of the leading spirits are making energetic endeavors to have matters so arranged that real business will commence next week.

The Carlisle-Thoebbe case ended in a manner that was almost ludicrous. It collapsed entirely and the alleged counsel for Thoebbe, Mr. Syphax, was wiped up in a manner that must have surprised him.

Another letter, written to Lee Crandall, the Greenback-Labor agitator, contains some valuable information as to aid which Thoebbe was led to believe would be enlisted in his behalf.

Mr. Carlisle's counsel, T. T. Hallam, showed conclusively that every essential allegation made by Thoebbe's behalf was false.

The National Republican, of this city, in commenting editorially on a communication it published which placed the Utah question in a fair, clear light, made the following remark:

"A people without political power enjoy civil rights only by sufferance, and that is against the principles of our form of government."

The leading financial, commercial, shipping, railroad and other companies were appealed to to endorse the Mormons and the true position of Utah's legitimate citizens was clearly stated and shown to be honest and proper.

COMBINATION OF MONOPOLY.

Explosion at Amoy—Parcel Post Convention—Confidential Whisper—House Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, January 20.—The action of the House in adjourning to-day, without disposing of the Thoebbe-Carlisle case, rendered it impossible that the vote by which the resolution for the reopening of the case was defeated yesterday, can be reconsidered, except by unanimous consent, the time within which such motion could have been entered as one of privileges, having expired with to-day's session.

There is every indication that the House committee on Territories proposes to treat the Territories fairly. The Herald correspondent has, during the past week, talked with every member of the committee, and they all say they favor a liberal policy toward the Territories.

"Have you read the Constitution recently adopted by the convention in Utah?" asked THE HERALD.

"I am sorry to say," said Mr. Springer, "that I have not. It is now being printed; I understand, and as soon as I can get hold of a copy I shall read it thoroughly."

"Then you are not prepared to state how you stand upon the admission question?"

"No, I am not. I think I will define my position on that subject before a great while."

On an average, about 100 bills are introduced each Monday, in the House, authorizing the Secretary of War to remove the charge of desertion against the military records of men who served in the Union army during the late war.

Men in the regular army and navy say the President is pursuing a course which he is determined shall bring about a better moral order of affairs than has existed for some time.

President Cleveland is reported to have come to the conclusion that there is entirely too much dissipation and looseness in the regular service; that there should be some very concise and positive action, and that he will steadily refuse to consider any kind of political influence brought to bear to set aside the decisions of courts-martial.

Three ships in the American Navy are to start on cruises around the world in a few days. They are being equipped for the purpose now, and their directions are to be each distinct from the other.

The confirmation of Justice Lamar did not excite any extraordinary remark, for it was definitely known that the Senate would reject Senator Stewart's vote went as he did, and that would have led anyone to imagine that Stanford's influence was going to be shown on Lamar's side.

The Situation of Germany, Russia and Austria.

WEEKLY EUROPEAN MINGE

Germany's Ability to Concentrate 1,000,000 Men on the Polish Frontier—The Crown Prince

BERLIN, January 21.—[Copyright 1888 by the New York Associated Press.]—Since the official organ of the German army, the military *Wochenblatt*, gave its luminous comparison of the strength of the frontier forces of Germany and Russia, discussion of the situation has elicited nothing more definite than the semi-official statement, in several papers to-day, that despite the arrival of additional Russian troops on the frontier, the German government for the present, will not order the central movement necessary to equalize the strength of the two forces.

The *Moscow Gazette*, yesterday indicated the pacific policy of Russia. It declared that peace was assured unless Russia should be provoked by the aggressive acts of her neighbors.

The *Sets* disputes the *Wochenblatt's* figures, and tries to prove that Germany can concentrate a million of men on the frontier of Poland within ten days, while Russia's huge areas of territory, and imperfect means of transportation, render it difficult work for mobilization.

Parliament adjourned *sine die* December 29. A few days before the adjournment, President Wilder was removed from office, on the ground that he had absented himself from the kingdom for an indefinite period.

CHICAGO, January 21.—The *Times* will say: There was a confidential whisper in circulation to-day, among certain interested parties, of an important deal on foot, which would be consummated within the next three months.

HUDSON, N.Y., January 21.—Judge Edwards, to-day, re-sentenced Oscar F. Beckwith, the Ansterritz murderer to be hanged on Thursday, March 1st, between the hours of 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.

NEW YORK, January 21.—Judge Maynard, assistant secretary of the Treasury, called early this morning on Collector Magone, and was closeted with him several hours.

ST. PAUL, January 21.—There was filed in the United States Circuit Court to-day, a complaint of the Horn Silver Mining Company against Dennis Ryan, demanding that he pay the plaintiff the sum of \$500,000, the amount of the loans unlawfully made to themselves by Frank G. Brown and Charles L. Franklyn, while directors of the company, with Ryan from 1880 to 1884.

TUCSON, Ariz., January 21.—A Star special from San Carlos says the Apache Indian who had been put in the guardhouse for getting intoxicated, asked to see his wife and child. When they were taken to him he cut their throats, put them in bed, set it on fire and rushed for the sergeant of the guard with a club and knife, but was ridged with bullets and killed.
