IN LEGISLATIVE HALLS. The Council Passes the Library University Bill. BILLS SENT TO THE GOVERNOR.

THE COUNCIL. All the members of the Council were in their seats promptly at 2 p.m. yesterday when President Smith called the house to order.

THE TERRITORIAL LIBRARY. A communication was received from the House, notifying the Council that it had passed H. F. 55, providing for the custody and use of books in the Territorial library.

ON FISH AND GAME. The Council was notified that the House had passed the substitute bill for H. F. 40 and H. F. 49, amending the law in relation to fish and game.

THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION BILL. H. F. 7 (substitute), an act providing for a Territorial board of equalization, having been passed by the House, was read for the first time, and referred to the committee on ways and means.

THE APPROPRIATION BILL. H. F. 73, making appropriations for general purposes, was taken up on its first reading. Mr. CARLSON moved that the reading of the bill be dispensed with, and the bill referred to the committee on appropriations.

FROM THE COMMITTEE ON COUNTIES. The committee on counties, to whom was referred C. F. 38, a bill defining county boundary limits and locating county seats, recommended that the bill be placed upon its passage.

AS TO OCCUPYING CLAIMANTS. The same committee, to whom was referred C. F. 24, a bill in relation to occupying claimants, recommended that the same be put upon its passage.

A NEW BILL. Mr. SMOOT presented C. F. 39, a bill to amend sections 791 and 793, chapter 6, title 11, of the code of civil procedure. The bill, which empowers marshals to serve papers in civil processes, was read for the first time and referred to the committee on judiciary.

liberations, however, were interrupted by the Speaker calling the House to order, when they retired into an adjoining room. Long after the opening of the House the seats of the committee above named were vacant, and the gentleman from Weber County was busily engaged in discussion with various members. At about 11 o'clock, the committee returned, but made no report.

H. F. 62, a bill amending the school law, passed under a suspension of the rules, by a vote of 13 ayes, Howell, Thurman, Greer and Wood failing to vote, and several being absent. It provides that the sum of \$10,000 a year be appropriated to the University of Deseret; provided that fifty pupils to be selected annually shall be instructed free of charge for two years in the normal department of the University.

FOR THE INCORPORATION OF CITIES. H. F. 75, King's bill for an act providing for the incorporation of cities, came up on its second reading. There was but little of interest in the consideration of this voluminous document.

MR. THURMAN moved that all the words after the word "traffic," be stricken out. He was not opposed to a proper celebration of our national independence, but did not believe that any city should be empowered to make appropriation for that purpose.

MR. ALLEN—No, that will come in under the head of "Amusement." After being under consideration for over three hours, the bill was informally laid aside and the House took up RICHARD'S COUNTY GOVERNMENT BILL.

MR. KIMBALL, by permission of the House, introduced and had referred to the livestock committee, a bill to provide for the revision of the brand sheets. Referred to the committee on livestock.

MR. ROUCHE, from the committee on agriculture and irrigation, reported back, with amendments, H. F. 8, providing for the establishment of an agricultural college and an experimental station, and asked that it be put upon its passage. Adopted.

MR. HOGG, of the committee to whom had been referred the communication of Marshal Dyer asking an appropriation for the purchase of a safe for the use of the warden of the penitentiary, reported favorably, and recommended that \$250 be appropriated. Adopted.

MR. HATCH, committee on claims, reported on the petition of R. W. Heyborne, assessor and collector of Iron County, recommending that the amount of \$34 be appropriated for his relief on account of uncollected taxes. Adopted.

MR. CREEK, from the committee on elections, reported back favorably H. F. 30, providing for the prohibition of the sale of liquor under certain conditions.

MR. CLARK—I move we now adjourn until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock. THE SPEAKER—The chair would remain the gentlemen that they must put in more hours if they expect to get half their work through.

H. F. 30 was brought out for second reading, when Mr. Hatch moved an adjournment until 7:30. After considerable wrangling, the House adjourned until 10 o'clock this morning.
