THE AUSTRALIAN TOUR.

The Excitement Over the Event in Chicago and Other Cities.

A private letter received in this city says: "The Spaulding Combination and their visit to Australia is among the leading topics in sporting circles in Chicago, and the advent of the players in Salt Lake must arouse such an enthusiasm as can be compared only to the royal reception of the Mississippi Valley carmen a few weeks ago. You at home have but a faint idea of how much free advertising Salt Lake got from the visit of the regatta teams, and it is because of reports of the royal treatment accorded to Mississippi Valley people as much as anything else that has influenced the combination to stop off at Salt Lake. As near as I can now learn, the route of the combination, and their stopping off places are as follows: St. Paul, Minneapolis, Des Moines, Cedar Rapids, Omaha, Hastings, Denver, Colorado Springs, Salt Lake, San Francisco. They will remain in Denver two days. They play nine games including that at Chicago, between here and the Pacific Coast. Traveling will necessarily be rapid as far as Denver, but at that place and Salt Lake they will indulge in the opportunity afforded them to stretch their legs and see the towns."

A baseball tour to Australia has been talked of for years, says the Sporting Life, but it needed a man of large financial resources, indomitable pluck, and keen business sagacity, like Mr. A. G. Spaulding, to take hold of such a gigantic scheme and carry it to a successful conclusion. The magnitude of Mr. Spaulding's enterprise and the great possible good that may accrue to the game through it, make it one of the great events of the times, and possibly will mark an epoch in baseball history. It is believed that the game can be popularized in Australia, the antipodes being a people akin to ours in spirit and characteristics. Should such a result follow the present introduction of the game in that far-off country, it is so very enough to imagine what a splendid new field would be opened to the game and to our professional players for winter trips or permanent employment. With the game established in Australia its transmission to other English colonies would be but a matter of time, and a permanent introduction into England itself would be among the possibilities. In time, visits from Australian teams and great international matches would also be sure to follow. Aside from the possibilities, however, the Australian trip will exert a marked beneficial influence on the game at home and abroad. This tour will stamp it in the minds of all foreigners as the national game of America, just as the visits of English, Irish and Australian cricket teams demonstrates to us that cricket is really the national game of the country from which the tourists hail. An international cricket match, for instance, in this country, will draw enormous crowds of people who know little of and care less for the game itself, but are simply drawn by the international character of the contest. This will be precisely the case with baseball in Australia. A baseball tour of such magnitude and under such auspices as this great Spaulding enterprise must need attract the undivided attention, command the respect and possibly the admiration of all Australians, and if baseball is to be, or rather can be, introduced into the Antipodes, it will be wholly and solely by means of this tour.

ST. GEORGE STAKE ACADEMY.

Now Open for Students—The First Academic Year.

The circular of the St. George Stake Academy for the first academic year, 1888-89, has been received. The first term commenced October 15th and will continue to December 21st, 1888; the second term commences January 7th, and closes March 15th; the third term on March 15th, and runs till May 24th, 1889. The Stake Board of Education consists of James G. Black, Chairman; Thomas Judd, Secretary and Treasurer; David H. Cannon, William A. Bringhurst, Milton L. Lee, Horatio Pickett and William Gardner. The academy is divided into departments—preparatory and intermediate, and is open for the admission of students of both sexes, who are prepared to enter at least the Fourth Reader grade. Applicants will be welcomed at any time, but it is strongly urged that students should enter at the beginning of a term whenever practicable. For those residing a distance from St. George, board and lodging will be obtained, and at moderate prices. The "Items of organization" are as follows: Daily opening and closing exercises will be held with singing and prayer. Theological exercises will be held in each department. A general class meeting will be held weekly. A priesthood meeting will be held once per week.
