Briefs.

THE trains were on time last evening. TRAVEL still continues heavy both ways. THE hotels are enjoying a good run of business.

THE streets are again in good condition, except a few loose stones.

Mrs. ELIZABETH E. DRYSDALE died in North Ogden on the 26th inst., of blood poisoning.

THE real estate market as well as all others remains firm with an upward tendency.

THE festive book agent is in town distributing tons of knowledge among the thrifty inhabitants.

ALTHOUGH the weather was decidedly threatening yesterday, an average amount of business was transacted.

THIS evening an illustrated lecture will be delivered at the Tabernacle. From the bills it would seem to be most excellent entertainment.

JENNINGS & BATEMAN, dentists, have sold out their practice to Dr. Calder, late of Evanston. Mr. Jennings goes to Salem, Oregon, there to re-engage in practice.

SOME eastern capitalists are in treaty for a block of land on Wall Street on which to erect warehouses. The trade is virtually consummated, but the deeds have not yet been drawn.

AT the Tabernacle yesterday a large congregation listened to an able discourse by Elder Joseph Parry, after which Councilor Barnard White addressed the assemblage in a few well chosen remarks.

WORK will be commenced this week on the iron mines owned by the Utah Coal & Iron Company, of this city, and will be pushed with that vigor that characterizes all the operations of its energetic owners.

HARK McCORD & Co. is the name of a new grocery firm that is now fitting up the large store under the Opera House for a first-class grocery-house. The position is central, being only two doors from the postoffice, and they will doubtless receive the liberal patronage usually accorded institutions of that kind.

WHILE the city lot is being graded around the new City Hall it would be a good time to send one or two teams out on the streets to pick up the loose stones that are constantly rolling into the ruts and onto the car tracks and have them dumped in with the gravel at the bottom of the grading. This would effectually dispose of them, and with three or four feet of dirt on top they would likely stay down.

THE piles of building material around the new depot are rapidly diminishing and the structure in their midst rears its magnificent proportions higher and higher. The timbers for the roof of the annex are in position and are plainly visible above the surrounding lumber piles and can be plainly seen from the old depot and from the bench. Brick from Salt Lake City continues to arrive in sufficient quantities to keep the men busy, and on the whole, everything is moving along as though endowed with life.

GEORGE S. PERKES came up from the capital last evening.

Wreck on the Oregon Short Line.

Yesterday afternoon as freight No. 9 was rounding the corner of Sixth and Main Streets, one of the chains that holds the bed of the car in position became detached and the contents were dumped on the outer circle of the curve. The car jumped the track, as did the two following ones, and they, too, had to be unloaded in order to get them on the track again. The two rear cars and the engine escaped injury, but the remaining cars were replaced on the track and taken up to the yard, where the word "shop" was inscribed on them. The necessary repairs will not be much, but the cars cannot be used until those repairs are made. Luckily no one was injured by the accident.

Police Court.

A large number of cases greeted Judge Dee yesterday morning, more, in fact, than have been before him at any one time for a number of months. C. H. Wilson, who was taken in from Lower Fifth Street on the evening of the 24th, and who was so drunk that an express wagon had to be used to bring him up to the jail, naturally pleaded guilty to being drunk, and in default of the required funds was sentenced to ten days.

Then came George Muir and Peter McFarland, who were arrested Saturday evening at a cigar store on Fifth Street for disturbing the peace. Evidence sufficient to convict was heard, and they were fined \$10 each, which they paid.

David Murray then came forward at the suggestion of the jailer. He pleaded guilty to being found drunk. He was induced to forfeit \$10 to the city for the offense.

Early on Sunday morning, about 1, William Bailey was found without the necessary to get a night's lodging or a meal of victuals, the police took pity on him and allowed him to remain over Sunday in the brick hotel (i. e. the city jail) and yesterday morning he was introduced to the Judge. The Judge continued his case, as the prisoner was not ready to plead to the charge, and if not sooner disposed of will come up again this morning.

Albert Nelson was the next to face the music. He was found about 2:30 o'clock, Sunday morning very drunk.

It took two officers to get him up to the jail. After having all day Sunday to sober up in, he deposited the usual \$10 and departed.

J. J. Baird then came in for his share of attention. His offense was drunkenness. The police found him at the old stamping ground—the depot—and he was so hard up he could not liquidate his fine, so the judge allowed him to assist in beautifying the streets of the city for the next ten days.

In the afternoon Charles Anderson, a boy from Ogden Valley, came in charged with petty larceny. He pleaded guilty at once and the judge let him off with a fine of \$15, which he paid.
