Briefs.

The plasterers at the City Hall will need this week and next to complete their work; not longer.

In the Police Court John Brady, a very plain and uncontrollable drunk, was sent up for ten days.

The Utah Central has changed the time of its evening train from Salt Lake. It now gets in at 5.30 instead of 4.55. The change took effect last Sunday.

The trains were all on time yesterday except the D. & R. G. No. 7, which was delayed by the wreck near Denver. The train was reported seven hours late.

The new banking company have secured the store room in the Broom Hotel now occupied by Thompson, the barber, and the barber will have to find a new location.

A large concourse of people were in attendance at the Tabernacle last evening to witness and hear the illustrated lecture on travel and other subjects. The lecturer was well received.

BENJAMIN PERRY, a young man of 19 years, died yesterday morning from hemorrhage resulting from typhoid fever. He lived with his parents in Wilson's Lane, one of Ogden's suburbs.

The grading around the City Hall is progressing in a systematic manner. The loam that comes off the top of the lot where they get the gravel, is being deposited on the front of the lot near Fifth street, and will be used for surfacing as the work progresses.

SIDNEY STEVEN'S new brick block is getting on favorably. The walls are up to the tops of the windows of the second story and the carpenters are framing the roof. It is expected to have a roof before winter sets in, and the finishing can then be done at leisure.

Personals.

WILLIAM WEST and William Marshal were brought up from the Penitentiary yesterday, and appeared before the Grand Jury as witnesses in a case of alleged horse stealing.

F. G. HUDSON, who has been for a year or more on duty at the Penitentiary, has been promoted to the position of deputy United States marshal and assigned to duty at Ogden.

M. J. CROSBY, master mechanic of the Southern Pacific Railway (Salt Lake division), and a former resident of this city but now located at Terrace, was in the Junction City yesterday renewing old acquaintances.

Of the Second Class.

The wards of the city recently defined by an ordinance passed at a special session of the City Council, seems to give some of the Liberal element a good deal of uneasiness. In fact, they claim the division is not what it should have been, and that the whole scheme was concocted to prevent them (the Liberals) from getting any of the offices in the next municipal election. Nothing can be further from the truth. The city is old enough and large enough to have a representation in the council from each particular part or ward, and according to the statute enacted last winter by the Territorial Legislature, the city was in duty bound to take such a step as it has done. Under the old law, where every office was filled by a general vote at large, as it is termed, it would have been practically impossible for the Liberals—as they choose to call themselves—to secure any of the positions elective except by aid of the People's vote. Now, under the new municipal provisions, one ward is almost sure to have a majority of Liberals, and perhaps two; at least they have an even chance of gaining their choice in both of them, but with little or nothing to spare. The other three wards will return People's candidates with a big majority, and thus what the Liberals have been asking for these many years will be accorded them, namely: Minority representation.

In looking over the situation and especially the insane kicking of the Liberals, one is put in mind of an old story, so old, that on ordinary occasions it would hardly do to reproduce it, but pardonable in this instance, owing to the great antiquity of the aforesaid kick. An eminent divine who had a very nice parsonage near his church, in a remote eastern city, concluded one spring to lay out a flower garden in front of his house. After having worked for a number of days spading up the sward and wheeling on fertilizers—most all the land in that country needs fertilizers to grow anything—he proceeded to lay out the garden in beds and walks, using geometrical precision in the circles, angles and elevations of the various flower beds, and anticipating all the while how nice it would look when all the seeds he had planted should put forth their foliage and bear roses and other beautiful flowers. In this lofty frame of mind he retired one night after he had completed the garden. Some boys passing late at night, and in something of a jolly mood, got into a scuffle, when one boy knocked another's hat off and over the fence into the ministerial flower bed. The lad quickly regained his head covering, but in passing overlooked to close the gate after him. Later on a neighbor's family of swine, consisting of the mother and about seven pigs, came along that way, and seeing the gate open and plenty of soft dirt highly impregnated with the stable fertilizers, could not resist the temptation to go in and disport themselves in such a field of luxury, and in they went and there they stayed until morning.

In the morning some neighbors who had seen the minister diligently at work for several days before, were horrified to find his yard in possession of the swine, and in a short time a number had gathered at his front gate to see and hear what the worthy divine would say when he discovered the dire destruction that had befallen his yard during the night. Finally someone more venturesome than the rest, went up to his door and knocked. It was some time before the door opened, but when it did the minister himself peered out to see what was wanted. The neighbor pointed to a corner of the garden where the old sow and her pigs had lain down to rest and

the minister stepped out to the edge of the portico, when the wreck of a whole week's work was suddenly presented to him. He viewed the disaster calmly and quietly for a moment, while his neighbors wondered if he would swear. But no! Glancing at the numbers at the gate, which by this time had been augmented, he quietly remarked, "Well, you can't expect one to leave things to suit a hog, can you?" and then without waiting to hear what remarks might be made, turned and went back into the house to his breakfast, as though nothing had happened.
