WHO?

The sensational story telegraphed from Indianapolis the other day to the effect that a conspiracy had been entered into to kill General Harrison, has brought out the question of who would be President in the event of Harrison's death. Every four years a similar query is propounded, and it is always variously answered, showing widespread ignorance of the details of our electoral system among men who should be familiar with it.

General Harrison being out of the way when the College meets in January, the electors would be free to vote for any other man. The probabilities are that they would elect Morton, President, as he would be entitled to the place in the event of Harrison's death after election, and would probably be the only person on whom all could agree.

A THIEF PARDONED.

Hopkins, one of the men who wrecked the Fidelity Bank of Cincinnati, has been pardoned by the President. It was represented to Mr. Cleveland that the ex-bank official was in the last stages of consumption, that he could live but a short time at most, and that it would be a Christian act to permit him to die at home surrounded by friends, instead of compelling his spirit to take its flight amid the locks, bolts and bars of a prison.

A FEW days ago the wires announced that a delegation of business men and manufacturers from Birmingham, Ala., without regard to party, had called on General Harrison and congratulated him on his election. The Republican press commented on the circumstance that many of the delegation were Democrats, and hailed their pilgrimage as evidence that business men in the South, irrespective of politics, were

pleased with Harrison's election. Somebody thought it worth while to investigate the matter, and his inquiries develop the fact that every man in the delegation voted for Harrison; some contributed money to the Republican campaign fund, and all are open and pronounced protectionists.

AN EDUCATIONAL QUALIFICATION.

South Carolina having set out to solve the suffrage problem in the way in which it should be solved everywhere in this country, a howl is raised that the negroes are to be disfranchised in that State. A joint resolution has been introduced in the Legislature providing for the submission to the people of an amendment to the constitution making the citizen's ability to read that instrument, as also the Constitution of the United States, and to write his name a condition of his voting at any election, municipal, State or national.

It would be better for the country everywhere if an educational qualification were required as a condition of the right to vote. Ignorance at the polls is almost as bad as corruption, both being destructive of good government.
