The Utah & Northern Still in the Consomme.

THE OTHER ROADS ARE ALL RIGHT

Improvements at the Power House of the Electric Street Railway Company—The New Officials.

Mr. J. H. Bennett, of the Rio Grande Western, said to a HERALD representative yesterday that his road would make no cheap rate and run no excursion trains into Salt Lake on election day.

The Rio Grande Western is on time as usual.

The Utah & Northern is still in the consomme between Franklin and McCammon.

The Utah & Nevada is all right. So far as is learned up to a late hour last evening, the Central Pacific was still open for traffic.

Improvements at the Power House.

Such improvements are to be pushed about the engine house and car sheds of the electric car line as warrant the belief that Salt Lake is to be favored with the most complete street car system in the west.

Work is being pushed for another engine to be placed in the south side of the engine house similar to the one now in operation, which will give the whole motive power available 400 nominal horse power, enough to operate fifty miles of tramway.

Close beside the present car shed, to the north, is just finished another building, for the same purpose, 125x25 feet, wholly fire proof, it being built of heavy sheet iron.

In it at present stand six handsome new cars, and there is room for at least thirty. The old car shed will be employed for repairing purposes.

A Lucrative Position for Some One.

Ever since George H. Daniels resigned the position of chairman of the passenger committee of the Central Traffic association, Chairman Blanchard, of the general association, has acted as chairman, while the office has been in charge of Secretary B. F. Knapp, a gentleman well qualified for the duties of the association. It is generally admitted that the affairs of the association since the retirement of Mr. Daniels have been conducted just as efficiently as before, while the salaries of chairman and a large force of clerks, etc., were saved to the roads. But, nevertheless, efforts have been made ever since to secure the election of a permanent chairman of the passenger committee, simply because a number of ambitious passenger officials are anxious to secure a lucrative and easy position. It is hardly probable that a sufficient number of roads can be induced to vote in favor of appointing a permanent chairman of the committee when nothing can be gained thereby except to increase materially the expenses of the association.
