The City in Brief.

The baseball season has commenced. The weather is cold enough to render active outdoor exercise very pleasant.

There appears to be nothing tangible in the rumor that a cottage hotel is to be built on the corner of Twenty-fifth street and Jefferson avenue.

Work on the big Twenty-fourth street block has not been suspended for lack of brick, as stated by a local paper, but is being prosecuted vigorously.

The old nights and chilly days are keeping vegetation back. Frost has been never known to be so "backward in coming forward" as they are this year.

A sprinkling cart was running on the bench yesterday as far back as Jefferson avenue. Two new sprinkling carts of the most approved pattern have been ordered by the committee.

John A. Dix, No. 10, S. B., will fittingly celebrate Memorial day this year. All the civic societies have been invited to participate, and the parade will be a most imposing one.

The snow is off the ground in Ogden valley, but that is about the only indication that it is no longer winter up here. The ground freezes every night and thaws but little during the day.

W. N. Cleveland, a native of Canada, has sworn allegiance to all foreign princes, potentates and powers, taken the oath of allegiance to the United States and been admitted to citizenship.

B. E. Wirtell, who for a long time was division superintendent of the Union Pacific railway with headquarters at Evanston, has returned to Ogden from a visit of several months in California.

The Bear Lake and River Waterworks and Irrigation company, who have their franchise for putting in a complete system for furnishing this city with water for domestic and other purposes, have let the contract for pipes and mains to the National Tube works, of Chicago.

T. S. Williams, proprietor of the Pioneer livery stable at Soda Springs, Idaho, has returned home from a visit to Ogden. He dropped a little cash here, believing that he could not do better with it than to invest in Ogden, really, which is conclusive that he has a level head.

There have been more changes in the clerical force of the postoffice here, but no improvement in the service and no prospect of any. The appropriation for clerk hire is now far greater than ever before, but there has never been a time in the history of the office when the service was so inefficient.

The Grand lodge of the Knights of Pythias will meet in Ogden next June. The jurisdiction embraces Utah and Idaho. Ogden lodge No. 2 are having their fine hall and other rooms on the third floor of Peery's building on Twenty-fourth street completely fitted up for the occasion of the Grand lodge meeting.

The attention of parties who are building dams in the streams of Utah is called to the law requiring them to put in fish dams or ladders, so that the trout and other fish can run up streams to deposit their spawn. Failure to comply with the law in this regard will subject the dam builders to severe penalties.

Mr. A. Wintrop, one of the best civil engineers in the country, has made up his mind to locate in this city. Last season he spent four months on the survey of the Pacific Short Line canal here, and has since been employed on the Bear River canal. This winter Mr. Wintrop has been in southern and lower California where he had charge of the surveys of some very important canals and stood high in his profession.

The promise is made by N. K. Bannister, an assistant chief engineer of the Pacific Short Line, who has just returned from Sioux City, that some time during next month work will be commenced on this end of the line. Should such prove to be the case, it will go far toward settling the doubts and fears that possess the minds of the people as to the intentions of that company which has talked so much and performed so little.

A letter, sent from here ten days ago, to a man supposed to be named MUM, was returned Monday endorsed "Killed." The man was a member of Ogden Lodge No. 2, Knights of Pythias, and also of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, but had taken a withdrawal card from the latter organization. He went to Milford with the intention of opening a saloon there. When a Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen goes into the liquor business he either has to withdraw from the order or is promptly suspended.
