

THE CITY COUNCIL.

A Rather Unimportant Session Last Evening.

MORE FRANCHISES ASKED FOR.

A Bill for an Ordinance Creating a New Sprinkling District—A Franchise Amended—Joe Silver Reported.

As the clock struck 8 the council was called to order by Mayor Scott, and business was immediately proceeded with.

THE PETITION OF HANDAN & BENSON TO PILE BUILDING MATERIAL WAS GRANTED.

The petition of Handan & Benson to pile building material was granted.

The petition of Edolice Jensen asking to be relieved of special tax levied on her property was tabled.

The petition of the Salt Lake Brewing Company to pile building material for the establishment of a grade and for other purposes was granted.

A number of merchandise dealers set forth that it was unfair for about eighteen fruit stands to run business, keeping open on Sundays, and asked that they be allowed the same privilege, or the fruit-stand dealers be restricted as were the duly licensed dealers. Committee on license.

SEEK THE SEWER. The petition of L. Scambian and twenty-five others for a sewer pipe and laterals on the north side of East Temple street, was sent to the committee on sewerage.

IN THE CENTER OF THE BLOCKS. The Deseret National bank and ninety-seven others asked for fire protection in the center of blocks by the establishment of fire plugs and additional hose in the same. Committee on fire department.

FORNIST THE SWITCH. T. O. Angell protested against the switch of the S. L. & F. D. railway to Burton, Gardner & Co.'s place on Eighth South. Committee on streets.

FILL UP THE DITCH. The petition of B. F. Allen and fifty-two others to have an abandoned ditch on Fourth West and Sixth South filled up, was referred.

ANOTHER SHOW. George Costello asked permission to use the eighth ward square for show purposes; was referred to committee on public grounds.

REFUSED. The petition of Sarah Ann George, asking for remission of special tax for water extension on Ninth East, was not granted.

WANTS A SIDEWALK. William Roberts and forty others requested to have a sidewalk laid on Third South, from Fifth to Eighth West, and that ditches be filled up. Committee on streets.

SHOULD BE GRANTED. Mrs. E. T. Crisman asked that the waters of the canal at Mill creek be drained and all decayed vegetation removed. Referred.

THE ATTORNEY OBJECTS. The city attorney reported on the matter of the petition of James W. Eardley for a deed from the city for a strip of land about four rods wide, running through the south half of lot 1, block 15, plat B, recommending that the petition be not granted. Adopted.

ASSESSMENT CONFIRMED. The city recorder reported that there were two objections to the granting of the water mains on J street, Third South, Fourth South and Fifth East. The objectors not being in the majority the notice of assessment was confirmed.

COMING DOWN A NOTCH. A communication was received from Mount & Griffling, offering to sprinkle the territory between and including Brighton street from Seventh to Ninth East, from Brighton to Fourth South, from Ninth East to Seventh West, not including Brighton street, for \$300 per year, for 5 cents per lineal foot.

IN CITY CREEK CANTON. A. F. Doremus, city engineer, reported the following work done and amount due John W. Scirell on his tunnel contract in City Creek canyon: 1890: feet of tunnel at \$2.00.....\$1,000 00 Less 20 cent retained..... 200 00 Balance due..... 800 00

DOWN TO BUSINESS. The city engineer also called the attention of the council to the necessity of taking some action in regard to properly irrigating the abattoir trench bordering the eastern sidewalk, near about completed along the north side of Second South street, and of conducting irrigation water across said street at the various necessary points. For this purpose he suggested a wooden conduit or other suitable and durable pipe, to be laid at such depth below the roadway as will insure it against damage from frost or passing loads. Referred to committee on streets with power to act as regards irrigating.

MUST GO DEEPER. A communication was received from Dallas & Hedges, setting forth that after digging down about five feet all around for the foundation for the new engine house, they found that it would require digging one foot more to insure a good substantial foundation. Filed, and architect instructed to make new contract and present specimens.

POLICE ALARM SYSTEM. A proposition from the Gaynor Electric company, in regard to the police system, was referred to committee on police.

ANOTHER FRANCHISE. The petition of the Salt Lake city rail road for a franchise on West Temple street, from First South to the southern limits of the city, was referred to committee on streets.

WANTS MORE POWER. Chief Stanton sent in a petition. He asked that an ordinance be established giving power to the fire inspector to have all dangerous materials removed and that he may instruct such persons to remove the same within three days after being notified. Referred to committee on municipal laws.

SPRINKLING DISTRICT NO. 2. An ordinance was passed creating district No. 2, as follows: All that northern part of Salt Lake city bounded by Brighton street on the north, Ninth East street on the east, Fourth South street on the south and Seventh East on the west, including the said streets, and all streets and cross streets, except Seventh East street contained within the above boundaries. The ordinance passed its first reading and was ordered published.

H. Williams asked to have a washout filled up opposite his premises. Referred back for a more definite location.

TO GO TO ORDER. The committee on streets, to whom was referred the petition of Mrs. Phillips Ferguson and Mrs. John H. Burton for the building of a wall, ordered by the former council, recommended that the same be granted. Adopted.

FROM JOE. Joseph Silver reported that after telling under sometimes a pretty warm sun he had succeeded in collecting from canine owners the sum of \$235.
