The case against Allen, Liberal election judge, accused of stuffing the ballot box for Parley L. Williams at the late school election, was taken up again before Commissioner Greenman at 10:30 yesterday.

Another discrepancy brought out in the case was found when the missing register book--produced by hauling Fred Kestler into court--showed that only 279 names were marked by Liberal Judge Ball as having voted, but there were 324 votes found in the box.


