

THEY ARE VERY SORE

Shoup and Dubois Over Their Disappointment

IN THE MATTER OF THE JUDGESHIP

They Will Offer Texas Angel's Name as a Compromise—The President Is Set on Beatty's Appointment.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(Special telegram to THE HERALD.)—Shoup and Dubois are determined that Mr. Beatty shall not receive the appointment of judge if he is within their power to prevent it. They have, as I telegraphed you several days ago, presented to General Harrison the name of Judge Sullivan as a compromise candidate. The President can find no objection to Judge Sullivan except that he is already provided for. This, the Senators say, is a mere ruse to justify his selection of Mr. Beatty. Should the President, however, refuse to appoint Judge Sullivan, they will then present the name of Texas Angel, the former law partner of Judge Sullivan. It is evident, however, that the President will in the end give the place to Beatty. If he does this, he must run the risk of having his confirmation defeated when the Senate comes to act upon it. The "silver" Senators, as the Senators from the Pacific coast and Rocky Mountain region are called, are all antagonistic to the administration and it is believed would gladly vote against Beatty's confirmation, if for no other purpose than to embarrass the President. Should they do this they can easily secure Beatty's rejection as it is well understood that the Democrats would also vote with them.

Both Shoup and Dubois feel keenly the slight which the President is putting upon them in forcing upon them a candidate whom they do not desire. They feel that the President is guilty of a gross injustice in pursuing this course, and they are not at all backward about saying so.

Frederic Mitchell Held as a Witness

ODEN, Utah, Jan. 21.—(Special telegram to THE HERALD.)—Frederic Mitchell, a colored porter in the Brown hotel, was taken into custody this evening to appear as a witness against Malachi Dillon, the murderer of George Mitchell. His bonds were fixed at \$500, and failing to procure them he was placed in the city jail. Unless someone goes his bond he will be in jail until the meeting of the grand jury. Several other witnesses will be held.

Montana Democratic Caucus

BUTTE, Mont., Jan. 21.—(Special telegram to THE HERALD.)—The Democratic members of the legislature held a secret caucus tonight, to discuss a proposition to submit to the Republican members of the House concerning a compromise. They will divulge nothing and no reliable information can be given until they communicate to the Republican house, which they will not do to-morrow.

The Montana Legislature

HELENA, Mont., Jan. 21.—There is some prospect to-day of a legislative compromise on the basis of a house membership of 27 Republicans and 25 Democrats, the speaker to be a Democrat.

State Senator Parberry suffered a paralytic stroke in the senate chamber to-day. It is a question if he can appear in his seat again during the session.

Since the rejection of the proposition to compromise the legislature troubles in Montana by the Democratic members of the house, there has been a strong demand by business interests for a settlement. As a result it is stated that the Democrats will make a proposition to-morrow that twenty-five members of each party whose election is undisputed go into one house, that the three of Democrats who claim seats from Silver Bow county, and the two Republicans also come in and the Republicans be organized in the house. It is believed the Republicans will accept the compromise and the deadlock be ended.

The World's Fair Directors

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—The World's fair directors have instructed the buildings and ground committee to take possession of Lake Front and begin at once the erection of the five buildings to which the property owners consented. In the event of objection by individuals, recourse will be had to the right of eminent domain. It is not probable all the Lake Front buildings will be so constructed as to be permanent, but at this point the officials decline to talk.

The Chicago Public Building

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The House committee on public buildings and grounds to-day agreed to report favorably the Taylor bill appropriating \$4,000,000 for the erection of a new public building upon the site of the present government building in Chicago.

A Mob Attempts to Flog the Wrong Negro

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 21.—Last night a dozen white men went to the home of Jim Blackburn, colored, and gave him a terrible flogging. The mob then visited the house of Rich Brown, colored, a man of some prominence, and battered down the door as they attempted to enter. The negro fired into the crowd, killing Jim Huddy and severely wounding another of the party. It is not known how the trouble originated.

Pacific Railway Company Receiver

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—George M. Hogue this morning was appointed receiver of the Pacific railway company, on complaint by judgment creditor, on complaint by judgment creditor. The bill sets forth that the company was organized in 1882 by C. B. Holmes, the well-known cable road man and other capitalists, with a capital of \$2,500,000, and is insolvent.
