POINTS FROM PROVO

Business Transacted at the Last Meeting of the Council.

PROVO WILL WELCOME HARRISON

Two Sunday Liquor Sellers Go to Jail for One Month and Pay a Fine of Fifty Dollars and Costs.

At the last meeting of the city council, the following petitions and communications were presented and referred:

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The committee on fire department, to whom was referred the petition of Knight Brothers and others, asking a reconsideration of the appointment of John A. Brown as chief and William Hill as assistant chief of the fire department, recommended that John A. Brown be continued, but that the resignation of William Hill, which has been filed, be accepted.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

A bill regulating the keeping and storing of combustible material within the city limits of the city, was taken up on its second reading and passed.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The mayor called attention to the fact that President Harrison would pass through Provo via the Rio Grande Western on May 9, and suggested that a committee be delegated to confer with President Dood, of the chamber of commerce, and President Smoot, of the Utah stake, relative to a welcome for the President to our city.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

On motion of Mr. Malben, a committee of one was appointed to confer with the gentlemen suggested by the mayor.

FIRST DISTRICT COURT.

Donald McPherson was arraigned on a charge of murder. The defendant pleaded not guilty and his case was set for trial April 29, 1891.

Stanley Reed pleaded guilty to the charge of house breaking, committed at the store owned by Kelly in Fillmore, and was sent to the reform school. Harvey Warner pleaded not guilty to the same charge. The boys are thirteen and fourteen years old, respectively.

J. W. Coburn and Lute Maham were tried on a charge of selling liquor on Sunday at their saloon at Clear Creek station. The jury in the case returned a verdict of guilty as charged in the indictments. They were each sentenced to one month's imprisonment in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$50 and costs.

FIRST DISTRICT COURT.

The Santquin riot case was next taken up for trial. William Taylor, Lars A. Johnson, Henry Boyle, Frank Halkyard and John DeSanger are accused of breaking up a ball at Albert Higgins' dancing hall on February 11, 1891. Mr. Jarvis testified that the defendant struck him while in the hall, pursued him out of the door and gave him a severe beating, breaking four ribs and cutting some ugly gashes on his face. A general row took place, in which there was considerable fighting.

A Franchise for the Salt Lake, Hailey & Puget Sound.

THE USUAL ROUTINE BUSINESS

The Claims of the Coroner Referred Back for Correction - A Man Taxed Three Times.

THE USUAL ROUTINE BUSINESS

In the county court yesterday an order was made in the matter of the suit of John W. Jones against Salt Lake county, that if the plaintiff would pay into the county treasury the costs of said suit and the amount of taxes and costs for which his property was sold in 1889, with interest on said amount, and disburse the suit, his property would be offered for sale at public auction to the highest bidder for cash, as provided by law.

THE USUAL ROUTINE BUSINESS

A resolution was passed granting a franchise to the Salt Lake, Hailey & Puget Sound railway, commencing at the intersection of the west boundary of Salt Lake city, sections 9 and 16, township 1 south, range 1 west, and running thence west and west-northwest across said county road, with the convenience of said railroad may require, to the western boundary of Salt Lake county, on the following conditions: The road must be laid so that the south rail shall be sixteen and one-half feet north of the center of the road; that gravel shall be hauled and spread on the road with an inch deep on the southern side of said road within one year after the acceptance of the franchise. Then follows a lot of detail in connection with the building of the road, etc.

The innate sympathy between the Kelt of Ireland and the Frenchman has often led to strange political complications, and many a prominent French family is of Irish origin. Great Britain had commanded her subjects to be neutral, but Captain MacAdams secretly organized about 5,000 Irishmen, pledged all his available means for their pay and equipment, and went to Paris to concert a plan for making a descent on the north coast of Prussia. Before he could get his forces in condition all was lost in France and he was threatened with arrest.

He crossed the channel in a fishing boat and hastened to Paris, but nothing remained save to assist in the final struggle. He saved part of his fortune, married an American lady from St. Louis and became an enthusiastic and popular Frenchman.

Franks of an English Fog. Some very peculiar effects have been produced by the long continued murky atmosphere at Manchester, England. According to observations taken during three days of fog, nearly six hundredweight of sulphuric acid per square mile was deposited round the infirmary, while round Owen's college the quantity reached four hundredweight, besides two hundredweight of hydrochloric acid and two tons of blacks. The leaves of plants growing out of doors yielded a deposit of from 6 to 8 per cent. of sulphuric acid and 5 to 7 per cent. of hydrochloric acid.


