

A DEAR OLD FAKE.

The Wild Man Scheme Pans Out Unsuccessfully.

THE SCHEMERS ARE CINCHED.

It Will Take a Great Many Dinners to Pay the Fines of the Proprietors of the Fraud.

The examination of Thompson, the alleged wild man of Utah, and his managers, Messrs. McGill, Brown and Mehan, on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, was held before Commissioner Norrell. The courtroom was crowded with people anxious to get a look at the rival of the wild man of Borneo, and it was with deep regret that the showmen saw their curiosity exhibited free of charge to what might have been a good paying audience. Thompson, now that his artificial hair and professional togs have vanished, is undoubtedly the tamest looking wild man ever seen. He is an undersized, insignificant looking fellow with a bald pate and a straggling beard. He was attired in a nondescript costume consisting of a broadcloth Prince Albert, a boiled shirt, which had evidently been in service for some months and a pair of overalls. The defendants were represented by Judge McDowell, while Frank H. Stephens prosecuted. Judge McDowell commencing by denouncing the defendants with outstaring money under false pretenses by representing that they had an exhibition of a wild man, who was captured in southern Utah and had to be kept chained in a cage, when in fact he was not captured anywhere, was neither wild nor woolly and did not have to be kept chained.

Mr. Stephens knocked the defurrer sky high, and the examination was then proceeded with. Deputy Marshal Bynon testified--On Saturday afternoon the defendant Branch was in front of a room on Main street shouting that they had on exhibition there a wild and hairy man, who had to be chained in a cage. I gave Branch 10 cents and went in. The defendant Thompson, who was supposed to be a wild man, was in a cage, and the defendant Mehan and Brown, who were supposed to be the wild man's keeper, I paid the money expecting to see a wild man.

Mr. McDowell--I had heard that the show was a fake and I went in partly to investigate it. Sheriff Burt testified--On Saturday my attention was attracted by the defendant Branch shouting that there was on exhibition a wild and woolly man, who was captured in southern Utah by cowboys and I had to keep him chained in a cage. I didn't pay anything to go in. I saw the defendant Thompson in a cage and this man Mehan was acting as the wild man's keeper. I asked the man who was really wild and they replied that he was and said I wanted to know anything more about him to go over to McGill.

I swore out a warrant for the arrest of them all and went back just as the show closed. The alleged wild man was just getting out of his cage and I told him I had a warrant for his arrest. He said at once produced a license from the city. Just then Mr. McGill came in and said that he was running the show and was responsible for everything. I took the wild man, plucked off some false hair, eyebrows and whiskers, and then took him into custody. Later I made him take a bath and this was the result (producing about a pound of store hair).

Marshal Parsons testified that he went to the show and saw the wild man. The defendant Branch stood at the door shouting that they had a wild man inside. Burt Russell testified that he paid 10c. to see the wild man.

Joe Jenkins, of the Times, testified that some time ago McGill told him that a wild man had been captured and he expected to exhibit him here. The defendant Thompson was here some time ago. He was engaged in passing bills for Wonderland. I heard him say that he expected to go on exhibition as a wild man. This occurred five or six weeks ago. Thompson was then being fixed up as a wild man. He had a bottle of whisky and I took a drink with him. I have since been discharged from Wonderland, never heard it said that he was to be exhibited at Wonderland.

Deputy Marshal Hyton testified that he went to see the wild man on Thursday, paying 10 cents. The defendant Mehan was standing by the case with a stick. He told me that the wild man was captured by cowboys in a cave in the mountains. The prosecution rested here, and Judge McDowell promptly moved for the discharge of defendants, because the elements of the case charged had not been proved. The witnesses for the prosecution did not rely at all upon the representations made by the defendants. If the thing was the greatest swindle on earth, still if the parties went in understanding the nature of the affair, then it was not obtaining money under false pretenses.

The court said the proof certainly showed that it was represented that a wild man was on exhibition, but there had been no showing made that any witness went in expecting to see a genuine wild, hairy man. That was an essential point. The witnesses evidently paid their 10 cents to see a fraud, supposing that it was a fraud. He was inclined, therefore, to discharge the defendants.

Mr. Stephens promptly called the court's attention to the fact that it had at least been clearly shown that the defendants were guilty of an attempt to obtain money under false pretenses, and they should be held for that. Said offense was punishable by one-half that fixed for the higher offense.

TO OPEN UP A STREET

Thirteenth East to be at Once Lengthened Out.

REALTY AND BUILDING NOTES

A Better Class of Inquiries Received at the Chamber of Commerce--The Realty Sales of Yesterday.

A petition is being circulated among the residents of Sugar House ward asking the county court to open Thirteenth East street from the city limits to Twelfth South, or the Penitentiary road. The petition sets forth that owing to the rapid increase in population in that neighborhood and the desirability of this street for residences, the petitioners regard the opening of the street as necessary to public convenience, and as a number of the residences are now being built on that street, it is necessary that it be opened at once. Over one-half of the parties interested have already signed the petition and a number of others will be secured in time to present the document at the next meeting of the county court.

The Chamber of Commerce. A noticeable feature of the inquiries recently received at the chamber of commerce is the more substantial nature of the correspondence. Those who seek information are generally men of means desiring to invest in Salt Lake city, while many others wish to remove their business here if the opportunity affords. Within the past few days several parties having from \$5,000 to \$20,000 to invest in Salt Lake have addressed the chamber of commerce on the subject. Milford, Delaware and Chicago parties are among the ones from whom correspondence was received yesterday asking for information concerning Salt Lake and the prospects of engaging in business here.

Casady has arrived in the city with his family, and will build a residence in Fondulac's addition, on Third East and Tenth South streets. J. T. Several new buildings are being contemplated in View City, and others are now in completion, among which may be mentioned a neat cottage being built by F. M. Schmitz.

L. E. Casady yesterday sold a house and lot in Fountain place, on the corner of Fourth West and Ninth South, to J. S. Turnbull, the consideration being \$1,775. Mr. Casady also has two other sales pending in the same addition. John R. Smith has just completed the addition to his present residence, and will this week begin the erection of another handsome residence, to cost \$2,500, in View City, part of the material being all ready on the ground.

Hide have all been received for the building of John Sharp's new residence on E street, between Brigham and First streets. The structure will be of brick and stone and will cost perhaps \$5,000. The plans and specifications were prepared by Architect Kaylor.

The new carriage factory being built by Nelder & Cleland on First South street, between West Temple and First West, is nearly completed, and the firm expects to begin moving their machinery, tools and supplies to-morrow and will be ready to do business in their new quarters in a very short time.
