

Colonel Murray contributed his full share to activity by making another distribution of North Eureka stock among the brokers at 10 cents per share.

Big Hole opened at 8 1/2 cents, but declined under Hamberger's heavy selling to 5 cents.

Apex sold at 1 1/2, buyer thirty days, and 1 1/2, seller thirty days.

Hamberger sold 1,000 Congo to Conklin at 1 1/2, and 3,000 Main to Stevenson at 3 cents, seller 10 days.

THEY ARE WORKING

John Henry Smith and John Zane on the Stump.

BOOMING THEIR POLITICS IN PROVO They Do Not Meet With a Very Flattering Reception in the Garden City of Utah.

John Henry Smith and John M. Zane came down from the capital to-day and immediately went out into the streets and began preaching the doctrines of Republicanism. Men, women and children gathered around John Henry to discover what new doctrine had now found root in his mind, and when they retired from the presence of the Republicans their ears were ringing with protection, pauper labor and disruption of Utah politics.

Every store and shop in the city was visited by these missionaries to seek out those who were in sympathy with the principles of their party, induce them to attend a mass meeting to-night and effect the organization of a Republican club.

In their jaunt over the business portion of the city they must have felt somewhat chagrined at finding so many Democrats to combat, as it was observed by the writer that out of between ten and fifteen prominent business men who were accosted by the apostles of Republicanism nearly all replied: "Gentlemen, we are of the Democratic persuasion."

However, they have succeeded in ferreting out a few of their political faith and will make a desperate struggle for organization. The Enquirer has been caused in the whirl and has exhibited a Republican complexion, although for the time being they are traced to the People's party platform. Exactly what stands they will take in national politics has not as yet been positively determined.

Smith and Zane have made themselves unpopular around Mr. Zane's mansion since their arrival in the town.

PASTOR JEFFRIES. A petition is being profusely signed by the members of the Methodist church and the people of Provo generally for the re-appointment of G. M. Jeffries as pastor of the above-named church in our city.

Jeffries has acquired a popularity among all classes. He is enterprising, genial in manner, a good pastor, and his energies are largely devoted to the advancement of the interests of Provo. There is no doubt but that he will receive a re-appointment.

THE TINTIC RAILWAY. The point at which the Tintic railway will junction with the Rio Grande Western has not yet been decided upon. A strong effort is being made by the Springville people to make that the initial point, and Provo has now awakened to the importance of the situation and will meet the officials of the Rio Grande Western through a delegation from the chamber of commerce in the vicinity of the former to look over the grounds in the future. There is but little doubt about Provo securing the junction, as the importance of the city demands it, and she is able to offer heavier inducements than the other points.
