

ABOUT IRRIGATION.

Finishing Touches Preparatory for the Congress.

EVERYBODY WILLING TO HELP.

Hall, Light, Music, Hotel, Railroad and Other Accommodations Discussed and Settled.

A joint meeting of the several committees having the matter of the approaching irrigation congress in hand, was held last night at the rooms of the secretary in the board of trade building.

Colonel John W. Donnellan, president, and the secretary presided over the proceedings by reading a report of the two last meetings, which was duly approved.

In response to a communication sent General Superintendent Clark, of the Union Pacific railway, regarding an excursion for the congressional delegates, the following telegram was read:

To Col. J. W. Donnellan, Chairman General Committee: Arrangements already made by instructions through Mr. Hutchinson to Mr. Hancock to arrange complimentary excursion for delegates to the Irrigation Congress.

On motion a vote of thanks was ordered for the courtesy extended.

In response to a friendly invitation to be present at the congress, Hon. John I. Houtz of Colorado, having indicated that he might be detained by an engagement at Grand Junction, the secretary was directed to address him at that point and urge him to extend his trip this far, at least, before the final adjournment of the congress.

In a communication with the secretary of the general committee, the mayor reported, through Chairman Donnellan, that water would be returned in the irrigation districts during the session, and that special orders had been given for the cleaning and sprinkling of the streets preparatory to the reception of the guests.

As to the lighting of the city, the secretary was directed to arrange for the same, notwithstanding the moon was visible for "several fulls."

The place for holding the session of the congress has been fixed at the board of trade building, but after a thorough canvass of the merits of all points, the committee finally accepted the generous offer of the Deseret Agricultural and Mechanical Society to use their building.

The total capacity of the house was estimated at over three thousand. Ample room for all committees is to be had and desks, chairs, etc., have been provided for their use.

The hotel rates were discussed and it was decided that the secretary should be in the body of the auditorium, a stage for officers and special guests occupying one end thereof. This would be protected by a guard railing.

Below, tables on either side, above and below, tiers of seats would be raised in amphitheatre style.
