Look Out for Robbers.

A gang of housebreakers and robbers seem to have struck Ogden, and almost every night for nearly a week past there have been houses broken into. Night before last the residence of Officer George Brown, near the corner of Twenty-fifth street and Adams avenue, was entered and a quantity of silverware, the property of Mrs. John Brown, and some money was successfully extracted from the place by the culprits. No clue to the perpetrators has been obtained.

At 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon a Chinese gardener, back across the Weber river, was entered by four men and robbed of \$150. The Chinaman was at work in his garden when the affair happened. They entered the place through the back door, where they applied tools to the lid of a trunk underneath which they found the money concealed. The culprits took a number of silk handkerchiefs and other silk goods belonging to the "John."

A Big Suit. A complaint was filed in the First district court yesterday by Judge W. L. Maginnis, attorney for William Garland, plaintiff, vs. the Bear Lake and River Waterworks and Irrigation company; Jarvis-Conklin Mortgage Trust Co., W. W. Corey, Amos H. Corey, Charles J. Corey, W. H. Wattis, E. O. Wattis and the Executor Redwood Co., defendants.

The complaint contained forty-three pages, with no exhibits, closely written pages, and involves a sum of close to \$115,000. The plaintiff has sued for a mechanic's lien, and now brings suit that the Great Bear River canal be sold to satisfy his claim.

In the complaint it is prayed: 1-That the liens and claims upon the property hereinafter described shall be marshaled, and this plaintiff may be decreed to have the first lien upon the said premises of \$100,571.18, together with the interest on \$125,000.00 from the first day of December, 1890, less the interest on \$17,411.01 from July 28, 1890, to December 23, 1890, and on \$2,077.14 from August 20, 1890, to December 23, 1890.

2-That in default of the payment of the sums of \$100,571.18, together with the interest on \$125,000.00 from the first day of December, 1890, less the interest on \$17,411.01 from July 28, 1890, and on \$2,077.14 from August 20, 1890, to December 23, 1890, the said property shall be sold, as upon execution, and the proceeds applied to the payment of said claim of this plaintiff.

3-That this plaintiff may have and recover a judgment against the said defendant, the Bear Lake and River Waterworks and Irrigation Co., for the said sum of \$100,571.18, together with interest on \$125,000.00 from the first day of December, 1890, less the interest on \$17,411.01 from July 28, 1890, and on \$2,077.14 from August 20, 1890, to December 23, 1890.

4-For such other and further relief as to the court may seem proper in the premises.

The complaint and the amount involved are among the largest ever brought in the First district court.
