LOGAN COUNTY IDAHO

Interesting Figures on the Population of Idaho by Counties.

BELLEVUE AS A CHURCH TOWN

A Town of Grass Widows—Good Schools—Who Starts the Cow Will Not Join the Test Case—General News Notes.

I am in receipt of an official census bulletin of Idaho's population by precincts and counties. Following is what it shows:

This bulletin gives the population of the state of Idaho in detail by cities, towns and precincts, according to the official count of the returns made under the eleventh census, taken as of June 1, 1890. The figures for 1880 are also given for purposes of comparison.

The population of the state of Idaho according to the present census is 84,383. The population in 1880 was 60,000. This is an increase of 24,383, or 40.7 per cent. during the decade.

Five new counties have been formed since 1880: Blaine from part of Blaine county; Boise, Idaho and Lemhi counties; Elmore in part from part of Blaine county; Latah in part from part of Nez Perce; Logan in 1889 from part of Blaine county.

In these counties only are decreases shown. Those apparent decreases are due to the fact that portions of those counties were taken to form other counties.

The following summary shows the population of each county according to the censuses of 1890 and 1880, with the increase or decrease during the decade.

BELLEVUE'S CHURCHES.

Our town is now without a resident minister of any denomination. This is unusual, in fact, the first time, I really believe, since the first settlement here in 1870. But we have had a siege in the past. The town has been a couple of times besieged, and some of our prominent citizens have been saved before now through the shouting Methodists, and they have forgotten all about it, long ago. They are as far from the gates as ever.

Then we have had our people who thought so much of salvation that at one time an entire family—father, mother and two daughters—partook of salvation in the Baptist church, and the ice in the river was necessarily broken to get them in all that time. The baptizing teeth, the banks were thronged with people, and the Salvation Army also had a field here at one time, fixed up extensive barracks, had a couple of ladies here, and among the converts was one of the business men. But times have changed since.

The Presbyterian church lost its last pastor, Rev. T. Miller Smith, who branched out as a newspaper man and political end-man for Senator McConnell. It was even reported at one time that Smith was in the insane asylum, and that he was later returned that he was married. The last I heard of him he had a scheme.

But the Catholic and Episcopal churches have never had resident shepherds in Bellevue. Priests visit this place regularly, however, but the attendance on each is quite small.

GENERAL NOTES.

John Halley, as attorney for the county, goes over to Mountain Home this week to look after an account Logan has against Elmore county.

Can a county rancher have been thick on our streets lately, looking for a market for grain. Broadford, just across the river from Bellevue, is a town of grass-widows. I had counted out to me the other day seven grass-widows living there. The husbands have been compelled to strike out for work, and find it profitable to rustle along, and it may soon be chronicled of a grass-widow exodus from Broadford—when the dear husbands find work.

S. B. Kingsbury, the Halley attorney, created much excitement at his home last Monday. He had been suffering with neuralgia, and his attending physician injected morphia. Mr. Kingsbury was dead to the world the entire day, but was revived about 4 p. m., having a close call. His family is on a visit to California.

Mrs. J. H. Hague is awaiting the beginning of our winter before her departure to Salt Lake city on her way to California for work. It is said the Logan commissioners don't think well of Bingham county's proposition to test in the courts the recent outrageous work of the state board of equalization, and

they will no doubt refuse to take part in the talked-of test. Logan county's reduction by the state board is \$800,070.

Several large placer mining sales are being negotiated along Snake river, about the Salmon Falls section, this county.
