A KEELY INSTITUTE

One to be Established at the Hot Springs.

CONTRACT CLOSED YESTERDAY

The Directors of the Sugar Factory Return From Lehi—The Real Estate Sales—Business Briefs.

It has been known for some time that the Keely Institute company of Dwight, Illinois, contemplated establishing a branch at some point in Utah, but until yesterday the location was not definitely determined upon. The following telegram explains the situation:

DWIGHT, Ill., Dec. 3, 1891.

J. F. Woodman, President Keely Institute company, Salt Lake City:

Contract for Utah Keely Institute closed today. Location, Hot Springs, Salt Lake. You can let contract for building immediately. Over one thousand patients now here. A call at Architect Kletting's office revealed the fact that plans and specifications are being prepared and are about ready for the inspection of contractors and builders.

The main building, to be used as a hotel and boarding house, will be located on the plateau just above and east of the large hot spring.

It will be 114 feet in length, with two wings 60 feet each. The building will be of frame and two stories in height, having a veranda around the entire structure.

The interior arrangement will be of the most improved pattern, containing a reception hall, physician's office, manager's room, dining hall, and a reading and club room.

The bed rooms will be conveniently arranged and the entire building fitted throughout with modern conveniences.

The hotel will have a commanding site, the view to the west, north and south being unobstructed. The estimated cost is between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

The baths will be supplied at the spring house about one block distant, and graded walks, drives and grass plats will be laid out and improved.

This will undoubtedly prove the nucleus of a great sanitarium, within convenient distance of Salt Lake, being easily reached by the new canyon line as also by the Union Pacific and Rio Grande Western.

THE SUGAR FACTORY.

The Directors Highly Pleased with the Showing.

President Morris and the directors of the sugar factory returned from Lehi yesterday. They made a careful inspection of the machinery, etc., and Mr. Rowe stated to a Herald reporter that all were highly pleased with the showing made. During the twenty-four hours that the directors spent at Lehi 330 tons of beets were run through the factory. The machinery works perfectly, and the sugar produced is of the best grade. Prof. Talmage accompanied the party on the trip.

NEWS FROM THE MINES.

Good Reports From La Plata—Concentrate, Ore and Bullion.

Old R. Propper was down from the La Plata mines yesterday and reports everything moving along nicely at the camp.

The La Plata Mining company has completed and is now working the mine with hoisting works of sixty-horse power. The shaft is down fifty to a foot and forty men are employed.

Work is progressing very nicely at the Sunrise and Sundown claims.

The Prospect continues to show up well, and a body of ore of almost the same appearance has been opened in the Last Dollar claim, about one hundred feet from the Red Jacket.

A well defined lead in the Wyanadotte is being worked and indications point to a rich strike.

About a dozen claims are being worked at present, which will be kept up all winter, and in seven mines paying ore is being taken out.

Mr. Propper estimates the population of La Plata at 30, and he believes that the new camp will enjoy a genuine Leadville boom in the spring. About seventy log houses have been erected.
