Mrs. Luther Identified—No Tax Sales—Snow and the Railroads—Ours.

The mystery in the case of Mrs. Luther is solved. Several weeks ago THE HERALD gave an account of a lady, about eighty years old, taken from a Southern Pacific passenger train in a demoralized condition.

On the back of this ticket was a note which stated it had been purchased for her by John McConnell.

The following day, after she had rested, the lady's mental powers were somewhat improved, and she was able to give the names of some of her relatives and where they resided.

The sheriff and probate judge sent telegrams to them, but they were all returned with the information that the parties could not be found.

Judge Bishop addressed a communication to the postmaster at San Francisco asking him to trace up and find if possible, John McConnell, the man who had purchased the ticket.

Through a careful search the postmaster was able to find him and the letter of Judge Bishop was handed to him, conveying the information of the whereabouts of Mrs. Luther, who, it seems, is his mother-in-law.

On the previous day, Mr. McConnell learned from a daughter of Mrs. Luther living in New Bedford, Mass., that she had not reached her destination.

On receiving the letter from Judge Bishop, Mr. McConnell started for Ogden and arrived here yesterday morning.

Julius Henkapp went to the poor farm yesterday afternoon and met Mrs. Luther to Ogden, and was met at the depot by Mr. McConnell, whom she recognized.

They went east last evening over the Union Pacific.
