A Rather Quiet Week Among the Hills.

SNOW RETARDS PROSPECTING

Business generally has been only fair during the week, although in some lines there are prospects of an immediate improvement.

Yesterday's clearings, \$234,500; same day last year, \$212,000; week's clearings, \$1,534,322; same week last year, \$1,057,304.

J. A. Mahan, who has lately paid a visit to most of the surrounding mining camps, is in the city for a short rest.

The ore and bullion shipments made during the past week reached \$170,307.88 as compared with \$199,082.00 for the week previous.

General Mining News. Ore is being taken out of the Old Winamuck.

The Turngren Mining company, of Bingham, has a large amount of ore on the dump, which will be sent to the smelters in the Salt Lake valley as soon as spring opens.

The Brooklyn shipped 350 tons of ore last week. The Argentine group at Bingham will soon increase the present force of men.

The Utah, of Fish Springs, sent in two carloads of ore, which showed 435 ounces silver to the ton.

The Trinity, of Bingham, shipped twenty-five tons of ore showing a silver and 3 1/2 gold.

The Red Rose, near Silver City, is again attracting the attention of mining men by coming to the front with another rich strike.

Two shifts are now being worked in the Pasadena, at Tintic.

Fifty tons of ore are now being daily treated at the old Mammoth mill, near Ironton, at a good profit.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Mammoth and Ironton, there were 200,000 of the 400,000 shares represented.

The Sampson, at Bingham, has a large amount of ore on the dump, which will send its way to the Salt Lake market.

The new Conklin sampler is ready for operations within a couple of weeks.

A letter from the operators of the Well Annie mine, in Eagle district, Deep Creek country, and which is owned by Salt Lake, says a four-foot vein of ore has been struck, going 400 ounces in silver and a two-foot track going from \$300 to \$800.

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THE TOWNSITE CASE

Witnesses Who Think That the Land is Mineral.

THE HEARING WILL BE A LONG ONE

Mr. Powers ran the Diabolo Tunnel for the Double Purpose of Striking Ore and Water.

Samuel H. Nelson was recalled for cross-examination in the Eureka townsite hearing yesterday morning.

Mr. Davis—Do you know whether or not your partner has offered to sell any lots?
