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THAT COAL COMBINE

The Herald's Exposure Stirs Up the Town.

THE SCHEME MAY COLLAPSE

It caused a great flurry in certain circles, as it may be imagined it would do, and there was no little consternation among the promoters of the scheme. Some said the report was rather exaggerated, but true in the abstract, while others, who will be deeply injured if the scheme goes through, were of the opinion that the combine was much larger and closer than had been stated by this paper. The Daily Copper Mines.

Sixty-two tons of copper bullion have been received from the smelter at St. George and sent on east. There are also on route 10,000 pounds of copper waste which will assay 61 per cent. Mr. Woolley received assays from a carload of ore which showed 40 per cent. The smelter is now closed down, but will be started up again just as soon as there is a sufficient supply of ore on hand. Work at the mine has been hindered because of a lack of timbers, which could not be obtained owing to the deep snows in the mountains from which they are obtained.

TWO UNFORTUNATES.

SALT WATER SPORT

The New Bath Houses Ample to Accommodate the Crowds.

Sunday Was the First Genuine Garfield Day—Union Pacific Officials Visit the Beach.

The hot weather of last week drove a great crowd to Garfield on Sunday.

The 2 o'clock train required ten coaches to accommodate the bathers and as each of the open cars seats seventy, there were 700 persons on this train. The later trains carried over several hundred more and by 5 o'clock 1,500 persons were enjoying the "new" Garfield accommodations.

There was the usual rush for bathing tickets, keys and suits, but the scramble did not last long, for the crowd was quick to see that with the increased bathing facilities a thousand persons could be cared for without taxing the resources of the beach of new bath rooms that now stretch up and down the beach.

More than half of those who went out took a dip and these were handled in the east wing of the bath houses. The west wing was not used.

Captain Dourie was on deck caring for the comforts of the crowd, and the arrangements and attendance was complete. There was plenty of general convenient shower-room and one can now enjoy the pleasure of a salt bath without being squeezed and jostled by the crowd; and crowded into a bath room with a stranger, and as was common heretofore wear a wet bathing suit.

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COUNTY TAX ROLL

Will Show Seven Millions Less Than Last Year.

A BOARD OF EQUALIZATION The Court Will Sit on August 2 and Continue in Session From Day to Day.

The county court met yesterday in regular session. In the temporary absence of Judge Hatch, John P. Cabana presided.

APPEAL FOR A PENSION.

The superintendent of the infirmary was ordered to employ a notary to make out the necessary papers in the matter of Henry Bowden, a pauper, an applicant for a pension.

WANTS RELIEF.

The petitions of John Davis, E. Helitzer and John L. Scott for relief on account of tax sales was referred to the county attorney.

SENT TO THE INFIRMARY.

Emily Peters was sent to the infirmary. ALLOWED \$10 PER MONTH.

Ellen Solare was allowed \$10 per month in orders for the support of John W. and Bertha M. Arnold during the pleasure of the court.

TO DEFINE THE DUTY OF THE COURT.

The county attorney was ordered to report to the court the duty of the court and board of equalization as to the matter of assessment and equalization of railroad, telegraph and telephone companies.

\$6 AND NO MORE THIS MONTH.

The court ordered that Mrs. Ford, a pauper, be granted an order of \$6 and no more for this month.

ALLOWED TO ERECT SCALES.

Ordered that George D. Nebeker be allowed to erect weighing scales in Granger precinct, to remain during the pleasure of the court.

THE SALT LAKE RAILROAD.

In the matter of the claim of Salt Lake county against the Salt Lake Railway company, Selectman Hardy reported that the amount due Salt Lake county is \$4,000.54, instead of \$2,739.54. Concluded that when the court adjourns it be until June 21 and that the franchise of the Salt Lake county be the special order of the day.

THE ASSESSMENT ROLL.

The county assessor presented the assessment roll for the year 1892, including the assessment for special school district taxes in Salt Lake county. The assessor was ordered to add thereto the assessment for Little Cottonwood precinct. The total amount of the assessment for the year 1892 has not been made up, but the County Clerk Allen says it will be about \$50,000,000 against \$47,000,000 for 1891.

TWO MILLS AND TWO MILLS ARE FOUR MILLS.

Ordered that an ad valorem tax of 2 mills be levied on taxable property in Salt Lake county for 1892, and that a like tax of 2 mills be levied for a county school tax for the year 1892.

TO SIT AS AN EQUALIZATION BOARD.

Ordered that the court sit as a board of equalization on August 2 and continue its session from day to day up to and including August 13 from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. each day excepting Sunday.
