SUMPTUOUS BANQUET

Colonel Hopkins Dined and Wined at the Knutsford.

Fifty of Salt Lake's Leading Business Men Introduced to the Distinguished New Yorker.

The reception tendered Colonel Hopkins by Manager Holmes of the Knutsford, last night, was a brilliant affair. There were present, the leading business and professional men of Salt Lake.

The liberal conduct to some extent detracted from the attendance, but the effect was not noticeable. Those invited began to arrive at 8, and assembled in the promenade, where they individually met the guest of the evening, Colonel Hopkins.

Colonel Hopkins just recently arrived in the city. He was formerly a resident of New York, but has located here, and is the man who conceived and will execute, within a few days, the plans relative to the Wilkes-Hopkins addition, situated within a stone's throw of Garfield pavilion.

The superb orchestra rendered a few choice selections and at 9:30 o'clock the assembly convened in the dining hall. An elaborate menu was served to about fifty guests, which was most delicious. On his left hand sat George Q. Cannon and on his right was Wilford Woodruff.

Colonel Hopkins spoke for a quarter of an hour on the resources of Utah and the Great Salt Lake. "I expect to crown my life's work in this beautiful valley," he said, "and am convinced that it requires but little pluck and energy to place this territory among the foremost states of the Union."

At 9 o'clock a. m. Judge Judd arose, and after a toast to the evening guest was proposed and drunk, the party adjourned.

IT COSTS COMPARATIVELY NOTHING TO HAVE THE FAMILY WASHING DONE BY THE

RICH GAMBRINUS.

Work Being Pushed on Various Properties.

The Cyanide Process to Be Thoroughly Tested and the Best Results Are Looked For.

IDAHO CITY, Ida., July 16, 1892.—[Correspondence of The Herald.]—The Gambrinus district, nine miles north of this place, is a scene of considerable activity.

The Washington mine, owned by Charles Balback, of Omaha, and J. V. Voshay, of this city, is having the water pumped out. The main shaft of this mine is 300 feet, with considerable development work in tunnels and cross cuts. The ore runs \$30 to \$45 in free gold. A splendid ten-stamp mill has been erected and the owners expect to realize handsomely from this summer's and fall's work.

George Chapman, sr., and Bill Libbey have struck ore in the Chalkblot which is said to run \$300 in gold. They have already tunneled 500 feet and will have to run the tunnel about one hundred feet more to reach the pay chute. This is regarded by all who have seen it as a real bonanza mine.

George Chapman is one of Ada county's efficient and energetic agriculturists, and his many friends congratulate him on this happy find.

The Jim Blaine is looking well. It has a 7-foot mill of pay ore, free gold, and a 5-stamp mill. It is owned by a Boston company.

The Boulder is a well-developed property and is being worked steadily; the vein is very large and free gold. The 5-stamp mill will soon be increased to a 10-stamp one and perhaps more.

The Elmer company of Banner will soon begin sinking a shaft from the 500-foot level to the 600-foot level in the Wolverine. This tunnel will be the working tunnel, and will dispense with hoisting ores as it is a clear drift to the mill.
