

THE TOURNAMENT.

A Big Day for Trap Shooters at Nelson's.

Anderson of Salt Lake and Dermody of Ogden, Will Contest for the Championship of the Territory.

Nelson's park, on the State road, will present a lively scene today, the occasion being the tournament of the Salt Lake Gun Club.

The order of the shoot and the prizes are given below:

- SHOOT NO. 1. Ten single blue rocks walk around. Entrance, \$1; 50 cents to pay for birds, balance to be divided, 50, 30 and 20 per cent.

- SHOOT NO. 2. Six single and two pair double. Entrance, 50 cents; no money. Prizes as follows: One split bamboo fishing rod, Browning brothers, to best man.

- SHOOT NO. 3. Ten single blue rocks walk around. Entrance, \$1; 50 cents to pay for birds, balance to be divided, 50, 30 and 20 per cent.

- SHOOT NO. 4. Territorial championship match between J. M. Anderson, the present holder of this city, and William Dermody, of Ogden.

- SHOOT NO. 5. Ten single blue rocks walk around. Entrance, \$1; 50 cents to pay for birds, balance to be divided, 50, 30 and 20 per cent.

- SHOOT NO. 6. Ten single blue rocks walk around. Entrance, \$1; 50 cents to pay for birds, balance to be divided, 50, 30 and 20 per cent.

- SHOOT NO. 7. Ten single blue rocks walk around. Entrance, 50 cents; no money. Prizes as follows: One case claret wine, California Wine Company, to the high score.

- SHOOT NO. 8. Six single blue rocks and two pair, all to be unknown birds. Entrance, \$1; 50 cents birds, balance, 50, 30 and 20 per cent.

- SHOOT NO. 9. Ten single blue rocks, walk around. Entrance, 50 cents; no money. Prizes as follows: One selected, Walker Bros. & Fyler Co., best score.

- SHOOT NO. 10. Five pair blue rocks. Entrance, \$1; 50, 30 and 20 per cent.

- SHOOT NO. 11. After the Freeman-McHugh fight. Freeman and McHugh have agreed to come together at Ogden on Thursday next, Aug. 4.

- SHOOT NO. 12. Freeman is from Pocatello, and he met Pocatello at the hands of Jim Williams in Pocatello on May 17, last.

- SHOOT NO. 13. McHugh is a native of Wisconsin, and his fighting weight is 150 pounds. He met and defeated several good men in his time, among them LaBlanche at Tacoma in a six-round contest, which resulted in a draw.

- SHOOT NO. 14. Sullivan's Best. Asked the other day what he thought of Corbett, Sullivan, with characteristic politeness, said: "You'll find that fellow in twenty minutes, sure!"
