FROM SALINA.

An Interesting, Newsy and Chatty Letter on a Variety of Subjects.

Great efforts are being made to establish good schools in every town, and new school houses are being erected almost everywhere in the county.

There is considerable betting going on in relation to the November election, but let the anxious ones "hold their breaths" for a few weeks and they will see.

The threshing is about over, and crops have turned out as well as anticipated in most cases. Wheat is selling at 50 cents a bushel, and oats at 30 cents per hundred, on trade basis.

To finish the week, we had a series of foot racing, and ending in a squabble and some nose pecking. Salina is becoming metropolitan fast.

Politics are taking the country by storm and politicians are not satisfied in educating the people in the correct doctrines of their respective parties, but indulge in quibbles and malicious abuse to an extent that is disgraceful.

Many predict a severe winter. If so, feed will be dear, no doubt, and wide awake farmers are making preparations to get the advantages of feeding straw and chaff, as much as possible, and keep the lucerna stacks to sell.

Considerable wool of the fall clip is being shipped over the Rio Grande Western road; but most of our Service sheep men have given up the plan of fall shearing as a ruinous practice.

The Richfield upper canal is not yet completed but will be this winter and following spring. It has been a big job. The Vermilion canal has been a great blessing to a great many, and dozens of homes have sprung up all along the line and the town of Vermilion, instead of being a small hamlet, will become in a few years a place of several hundred families.

Salina had a good run last week. Mr. King, of Provo, gave us a lecture on the principles of democracy on Monday evening. This was followed by the Johnson theatrical troupe of Springfield, which gave a very interesting performance, "The Flaming Bowl," Tuesday evening. On Wednesday evening we had Mr. Frank J. Cannon, on Republicanism, assisted by Messrs. Sutherland, Hon. John T. Canine and Mr. Van Cott finished the list on Thursday. I need not say that these gentlemen were well received. They had a rousing reception, flanked by cheers and yells, which, no doubt, raised the ire of the opposition. These were followed by street jangles on Friday over politics.

"Dry stock" have been coming down out of the mountains all last month to the damage of the farmers who are exposed and have no fences, keeping them on the look-out constantly. It is believed that the stock men profit a calamitous time for all kinds of animals which have to "rustle" their own feed most seasons. Thousands of head of cattle and sheep are reported dead, south of us, on account of scarcity of water and feed. But now that the fields are open, the stock which came down will fare well for a while.

Mr. Charles Kemp is doing a rustling business in slitting up roller mills, having completed one in Rabbit Valley. He has also fitted one in Salina and one in Mayfield, between here and Mant; and also anticipates putting one in Glenwood before long. This will give us five in Sevier county, and many, no doubt, for the present demand, but the county will grow up to the situation, as the people are constructing new canals and making reservoirs.

voirs in several places. The Gunnison reservoir having proved a success, Mayfield will prove a reservoir this winter, with the help of Gunnison people, who own a half interest in the water. The Gunnison stock has risen from \$10 to \$15 per acre this summer, and as the reservoir was about half full at the end of the irrigation season, more land is being taken up and new ditches made.
