

BUSINESS INTERESTS.

Big Increase in the Clearing House Returns.

One and Bullion at the Banks—The Wall Ankle Coming to the Front—Various Mining Notes.

The bank clearings took a big jump yesterday, the figures as reported by Manager Hawley being \$400,000, as against \$305,540 for the same day a year ago, an increase of nearly \$100,000.

At the Banks Wells, Fargo & Co. received yesterday: Mingo bullion, \$8,882. T. R. Jones & Co. received: Bullion, \$2,100.

The Produce Market Oats are now quoted at \$1.10 per hundred, an increase of 5c; feed barley has risen from 80c to 90c; cracked barley from 90c to \$1.00; while flour of all grades has fallen about 10c per hundred.

Saving Fleer Gold. A. O. Eckson, chief engineer of the Oregon Pacific railroad, and W. L. Scott, president of the Portland Loan and Trust company, have patented a process for saving the flour gold of Snake river. It is proved as successful as they claim, they stand an excellent chance of becoming millionaires. The principle of the process consists of forcing gold, carrying sand and silver plate through three separate mercury baths. The flour gold, which is so feathery that it will float on water, is thus secured. The mercury baths are charged with some composition that amalgamates the metal. Outside of the labor the Oregon invention can be operated for 10 cents a day, and any of the Snake river bars will yield from 10 to 20 per cent of gold when gold is saved. Ten tons of flour gold sand have been shipped to Portland and the new process will be exhibited at the fair.

The Cleveland and Toledo sent in a car load of good ore yesterday, after a lull of several months.

Len Colgan, who has returned from a business visit to the Ferguson district, is very much pleased with the outlook.

A strike of dry ore carrying 157 ounces silver per ton has been made in the 1100-foot level of the Yosemite No. 2 at Bingham.

Five men are now employed on the old Saranac, near Silver City, and it is believed that the force will be increased very soon, as the ore body is improving almost daily.

The directors of the Star company are more than pleased with their Idaho purchase. Captain W. H. Smith, the superintendent, is pushing work just as fast as it can be done.

The assessment work on the Minnie at Fish Springs has been completed. The tunnel is in something over fifty feet. In the last few days' work a small seam of ore was struck on a well defined wall. The Minnie joins the end line of the Emma. The correspondent who furnishes the above information says there is marked improvement in both the Emma and Utah mines.

A two-carload shipment of second-class ore was made from the Old Dixon Tuesday of this week. The grading for the large ore house is completed, the foundation is laid and the erection of the building has been commenced. A large coal house has been built adjoining the new hoist, and several other notable improvements have been made by the enterprising operator, Mr. A. P. Murphy.

The Well Annie Mine. "There are but few prospectors in Glenwood district at present," writes a correspondent. "I made an inspection of the Well Annie, the other day. Going in through a 100-foot tunnel, I came to where the miners are sitting on the ledge at an angle of 45 degrees. Twenty-five feet further down an incline, the ledge is from 12 to 15 inches thick. Twelve inches of the ledge is fine ore, and the remainder good second class. They are running down on the hanging wall, leaving the ore under their feet nice and clean. There was some trouble with the pump at first, but it is now working nicely. I think the stockholders of the Well Annie have reason to congratulate themselves on the outlook, for they certainly have the making of a great mine."

THE ART OF DINING. Some of the Remarkable Tables That European Rulers Furnish.

A writer abroad tells us that "no table in the whole world is served so solemnly or artistically as that of the Austrian court." Priceless porcelain, unique crystal and glass and antique gold and silver plate are used. "The damask is so fine that it looks like satin, and this is replaced for lunch and afternoon tea by a heavy white silk cloth and napkins edged with point de Venise and adorned with the imperial crest raised in gold embroidery."

As a dinner given some time ago at the Hofburg, in Vienna, in honor of the king and queen of Italy, luxury and exquisite taste were combined. "The cloth was covered with violets resting so close to one another that they formed a perfect bank of fragrant blossoms, leaving just room for the plates of semi-transparent Serrano, of the family rose, each of which was surrounded with a thick garland of marguerites. Marguerites being the Christian name of the Queen of Italy, her little namesake had been used with great profusion. Before each plate was a slender tulip-shaped vase of Venetian glass, mounted in finely wrought gold, containing a bouquet of marguerites and violets, powdered with diamond dust. The menus were engraved on thin sheets of hammered silver, with the Austrian eagle embossed on the corner. Everything was served on gold dishes, and the dessert plates were marvels of beauty."

HIGH-TONED CROOKS.

Harris' Sentence May Be Twelve Months and \$600 Fine.

Frank Daniels Goes to the County Jail for Ninety Long and Weary Days—Probate Court Orders.

In the police court yesterday morning George Harris, the thief who robbed the Z. C. M. 1, was presented for a hearing. Prosecutor Eichner, finding that it would be impossible to convict Harris of a charge of grand larceny, amended the complaint to petit larceny and placed two charges against him. Harris was represented by Attorney J. M. Hamilton, and upon his adjourned guilty to both charges. Judge Geo. remanded Harris for sentence at 10 o'clock this morning. It is highly probable that he will be given the limit of the law in each case—\$300 fine and six months' imprisonment. If this is done, Harris will spend the next three years in the county jail, unless some of his brother crooks produce cash enough to buy the nose and coat for him, as he has carried out his terms of imprisonment.

NINETY DAYS IN JAIL. Frank Daniels the high-toned crooked thief, was brought in for sentence. He pleaded previous good character and first offense to secure a light sentence but Judge Geo. informed him that there were no extenuating circumstances in the case at all. He then sentenced Daniels to ninety days imprisonment. Daniels has a number of strong friends who will endeavor to secure his release. The morning was so arranged it is stated that he was to go to work as a clerk in one of the city departments, the position having been secured for him by a well-known party.
