The Change in the Marshalling to Take Place Then.

Frederick Whitehead Gains a Verdict Against the Telephone Company—Protests Court Orders—The Alder Assignment.

United States Marshal Parsons will step down and out and Marshal Benton will take his place on December 1st.

Mr. Parsons has as yet decided upon no definite plans for the future and will not until he has turned over his office—a matter that will occupy probably an hour's time.

Verdict Against the Telephone Co. In the suit of Frederick K. Whitehead against the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff for \$500.

Share Orders Issued. S. W. Simmons vs. E. H. Parson, tried by court and verdict rendered for plaintiff. Exceptions of the defendant made and notice of appeal filed.

James Patricious vs. Salt Lake city, motion to amend complaint allowed by consent for all demands up to present time on contract, and case passed for the present. Patricious sues to recover on salary alleged to be due.

Warrants were ordered to issue for the arrest of Mattie Sharp and W. H. Cassidy under indictment for the same. As the defendants have already given bond, the issuance of the warrants is a mere matter of form.

To Inform a Judgment. D. M. Osborne & Co., a corporation of New York city, has filed suit in the Third district court against Byron Barnes and Edwin Walker to enforce a judgment for \$275 on account obtained in Commissioner Norrell's court.

The Alder Assignment. The W. L. Douglas Shoe company, of Brookton, Mass., in their own behalf and that of the other creditors of George A. Alder & Son, have filed suit in the Third district court against that firm, which states that for the purpose of enabling and enabling their creditors to determine the true purpose of enabling Geo. A. Alder to prefer fraudulent claims, the said firm was dissolved, George A. Alder retiring.

That George A. Alder assumed the debts of said firm, knowing he could not pay the same and in furtherance of the said fraudulent scheme made a pretended assignment on Oct. 13, 1892, unlawfully preferring the Union National bank and Lydia D. Alder as creditors.

That all the property included in said pretended deed of assignment of George A. Alder was the property of George A. Alder & Son; that the preference of the Union National bank and Lydia D. Alder as creditors of the firm.

That there is still due from said firm to the plaintiff and other creditors joined the aggregate sum of \$1,094.93. Wherefore the plaintiff prays that the court may determine and decree the assignment and preference unlawful and fraudulent and enjoin the assignee from paying to said preferred creditors the amounts of their claims and adjudge the same due to the plaintiff and order paid to them the proceeds of sale of property assigned.

EMERY AND GRAND. Only Two Counties Completed by the Censuses Yesterday.

OCTOBER WEATHER. It Was About the Average in Temperature—A Rather Dry Fall.

Director Salsbery presents the following reports of Utah weather for October:

Atmospheric Pressure—The barometric record shows a very uniform pressure throughout the month. The lowest barometer occurred on the 15th, falling at Salt Lake city, to 29.95 inches (reduced to sea-level). It rose, at Salt Lake city, to 30.40 inches on the 25th, and fell slightly below 30.00 inches during the rainy spell at the close of the month.

Temperature—The month of October was about the average in temperature. The average of eighteen stations throughout the territory was 53.3 degrees. Moab had the highest mean temperature, 53.3 degrees. Graysville had the lowest, 52.5 degrees. The warmest days of the

SIXTY FEET OF ORE.

Largest Body Ever Struck in the Bullion-Beck.

The Vein is of Great Richness, and Was Discovered on the 700-Level—Other Mining Mentions.

There has been a rumor for some two weeks past that an immense body of ore had been struck in the Bullion-Beck on the 700 level, but until this week the Miner has been unable to verify the statement. A body of ore has been encountered on the level above stated and the width has been demonstrated to be over sixty feet and the ore has not been found yet. The character of the ore is similar to that always found in the Beck, but is of much richer grade. This find coming as it does will be of great benefit to Eureka and the Beck company is to be congratulated. More men are going on at this mine, some ten or a dozen having been put to work this week.—Miner

The Black Jack Coal Mine. Martin Hansen, foreman of the Black Jack coal mine east of Franklin, thinks the prospects for a good mine there are very fine. They have just completed the sinking of a shaft through a twenty-seven and a half foot ledge of sand rock and a layer of clay. The next ledge of sand rock he thinks is about thirty feet through, and he expects to strike coal on getting through this ledge.—Logan Journal.

Badly Used by the Spadiere. The Dale Bros., on their return from Salt Lake city, claim to have been very badly used by the syndicate of mechanics, who have been working the Italian mine for the past four months. They claim the syndicate has taken out over \$15,000 in gold from the property, and now winter is starting in, think Salt Lake city a more congenial climate than the mountains around the Italian mine, so have quietly returned and decided that they were placed in error, and informed the boys that maybe they would come out in the spring and have another turn at the mine. The boys, however, propose when spring comes to try their luck with a syndicate of mining men and continue themselves to that class in the future.—Hydraulic Miner.

The Lemhi Power Mining Company. It is now a settled fact that the Kirtley Creek company of Idaho are going in for big mining operations. If not this fall, they will start in next season. They propose now to have forty men at work this fall getting the Canyon creek ditch in shape and doing work on reservoirs and flumes ready for business when spring opens and they can control the water now under their jurisdiction.

Idaho Mining No. 4. The mines of Lemhi are gold. The War Eagle Group is proving rich and will be sold. The sound of a stamp mill will soon be heard in this valley. Flats has been found at the head of Kirtley creek that runs \$500 in gold. The Spring Hill country, at the head of the Lemhi, is proving very rich. There are enough mines in Lemhi county to make every body in Idaho too rich to live. The Leasburg Syndicate will be in shape for big placer mining operations the coming year. Fine nugget gold can be panned out most anywhere along Mud creek, on the Combination company's property. There will be more ore concentrated and hauled out of Lemhi county when we get a railroad than from any other county in Idaho. Major W. S. Patterson has about consummated his deal on the War Eagle group and has made final arrangements for a custom stamp mill. Preparations are being made for extensive mining operations at the Yellow Jacket mine next season. They will build a mill next season. There are sixteen mines on the War Eagle vein. All rich producers in gold and have enough ore in sight to run a 20-stamp mill for a year. The mining interests now being developed on Patterson creek at the head of Patterson will be big producers the coming year, with the aid of a custom mill. C. E. Yates, the new superintendent of the Lemhi Placer company, is located at the company camp and getting things in shape for big operations in the spring. The Eldorado company are preparing for big operations on the Snake River country and will keep their ten-stamp mill in constant operation all summer. Our mining exchanges always have a good word to say for the Snake River country. They realize that gold is king, and this is the country for gold not only in quartz but in placer. The man who cannot get out here and make a good living cannot get out there. The sidehills is no good. We have an interest in a placer property out west that is richer than a newspaper. Parties are paying considerable attention to the copper deposits on the Snake River and Hot Springs. The ore in the vein is said to be equally divided in value of 50 per cent silver, with a fair per cent of gold.—Snohomish City Miner.
