

PROTEST OF THE BANKS.

They are Trying to Prove That They are Overtaxed.

THE CASES NOW ON TRIAL.

Cruel Treatment Causes a Divorce Suit.

A Small Verdict in a Big Case—One Divorce Granted and Another Applied For—His Honor's Joke.

The long delayed and oft continued tax cases in the city against the city and county collectors came before Judge Zane yesterday. There were two classes of banks represented—national banks and state banks—and likewise only two points of law for his honor to decide.

The national banks complain that their shareholders were assessed for the full cash value of the shares of stock respectively held by them, whereas real estate is only assessed at about 65 per cent. of its actual value.

National banks are not allowed to loan money on real estate, but in one or more instances some of the banks have done so in violation of the law, and in other instances they have discounted notes secured by mortgages.

The state banks simply allege that they were assessed upon the full cash value of their capital stock and surplus, and ask that they be allowed to deduct from the amount of such assessment the sum represented by their notes secured by real estate and that mortgages, being exempt from taxation under the law.

The cases were all taken up together and through the entire day was spent upon the hearing, they were not concluded at the adjourning hour, and will be resumed tomorrow at 10 o'clock.

HE ALLEGES FRAUD.

A Note, a Trust Deed and a Sale to Be Stricken from the Record.

Samuel Simpson filed a suit against Simon Bamberger, the Salt Lake Loan and Trust company, Samuel J. Kenyon and Charles E. Pierson in the Third district court yesterday. The plaintiff alleges that he executed a note for \$720 to Mr. Bamberger some time since to secure a loan of \$450 and a running account. At the same time he assigned to Bamberger a number of accounts, which he has collected \$900 upon, and to further secure the said note extended a trust deed for \$720, wherein Kenyon was made trustee and the trust deed made to the defendant loan company. It is then alleged that Mr. Bamberger assured the plaintiff that there was no need to pay the interest or to hurry about it, thereby inducing plaintiff not to insist upon his rights and call for a settlement; and for the purpose of cheating and defrauding said plaintiff he took an assignment from the said loan company and demanded the trustee to advertise and sell the property. On Dec. 12th the property was sold and the plaintiff was not allowed to purchase the property, which was finally sold to C. E. Pierson for \$800. Plaintiff alleges that Pierson has no money and that he was acting with Bamberger and that the scheme was a fraudulent conveyance for the purpose of defrauding him. Plaintiff further shows that since the said sale he has offered Pierson \$900 for the property, which was refused.

Judge Zane is not given to humor, especially when he is on the bench, but he said something yesterday that a certain attorney wishes he had left unsaid. The attorney wanted ten days to file an answer and the court was unwilling to grant it.

Mr. Eldredge Gets a Divorce.

George A. Eldredge was granted a decree of divorce from Jennie C. Eldredge by Judge Zane yesterday. The plaintiff testified that he was married to the defendant in 1885 and she deserted him two years later. Upon this testimony, corroborated by another witness, the decree was granted and the plaintiff awarded the custody of his minor child.

THE WEEK AT THE PARK.

Jobe, Charged with Adultery, is Bound Over.

A Meeting of Taxpayers—Masonic Officers Elected—Bribe Notes and Personal Mention.

The examination of William Jobe, charged with committing adultery with his stepdaughter, was held before United States Commissioner Hayt on Thursday. The defendant pleaded not guilty, but the evidence was deemed sufficient to bind him over to await the action of the grand jury. The bonds were fixed at \$400 and, failing to procure them, Jobe was committed to the custody of the United States Marshal, and was taken to the penitentiary.

THE BUSINESS WORLD.

A Big Arkansas Dry Goods House Forced to the Wall.

Fort Smith, Ark., Dec. 17.—C. Tiles & Co., the money dry goods house, has failed. The liabilities are \$70,000; assets, \$40,000. The big branch at Mansfield is also closed. The low price of cotton the last year and the shortage of the crop this year are the main causes, as the firm sold largely to the country on credit.

Another Arkansas Firm Fails.

Van Buren, Ark., Dec. 17.—Attachments aggregating \$90,000 have been issued against McKibben & Pape, this city. Short cotton crop and slow collections are the causes. The assets are unknown.

A Georgia Firm Assigns.

Savannah, Ga., Dec. 17.—G. A. Wright & Son of Cairo have failed. The assets are \$120,000; liabilities, \$70,000.

Weekly Bank Statement.

New York, Dec. 17.—The bank statement shows a reserve decrease of \$65,000, and a special decrease of \$719,000. The banks now hold \$5,445,000 in excess of requirements.

George Gonid Elected U. P. Director.

Boston, Dec. 17.—George Gonid has been elected director of the Union Pacific in place of his father, and Sidney Dillon Ripley in place of Sidney Dillon.

Colored Men's Brotherhood.

Topeka, Kan., Dec. 17.—Twenty-five colored men of the state were here today to form a colored men's brotherhood of the People's party. They propose to have an organization in every county. This is part of the plan of the Populist organization.

THREE OPIUM VICTIMS.

White Men Caught in a Joint Last Night.

Sam Wah Lung's Commercial Street Resort Invaded by Chief Paul and the Layout Captured.

At 10 o'clock last night Chief Paul, Sergeant Randolph, Detective Rhodes and Officer Howell raided an opium joint in the basement of the Oriental building, on Plum Alley, and made quite a haul. The chief and Officer Howell remained outside the place, while the others worked their way through the halls until they came to Sam Wah Lung's room. They found the door to this apartment locked and barred, and they proceeded to kick it in. This required some time and made a great deal of noise, and before they had succeeded the Chinaman came swarming around them like bees out of a hive.

On entering the room the officers found everything arranged for hitting the pipe, while the atmosphere indicated that some one had recently been engaged in that dream producing operation. Sam Wah Quong was there, but there were no pipe fiends in sight. The absence was at once explained by Chief Paul and Officer Howell, who loomed up at another door with three white men under arrest.

It seems that when the work of demolishing the door began, Sam let these men out from another entrance and they walked directly into the Chief's arms. They, with the Chinaman, were taken to the police station, and the latter possessed himself of the opium outfit, which will probably find a place in the Chief's cabinet of curios.

The men gave the names as Edward Johnson, Charles Jones and John Smith, and all stated that they were laborers, although the appearance of their hands indicated they had been engaged in any harder task than shuffling the parlor boards for some time. The matter will be investigated in the police court tomorrow.
