

BOREL'S BODILY CONDUCT.

Many Witnesses Testify That the Frenchman Was Crazy.

SAID HE WANTED TO DIE.

Attempted to Asphyxiate Himself in a Nevada Hotel.

News of the Day at Ogden—The Castella Hot Springs Property Transferred to an Incorporated Company—Provo Court News.

Ogden, May 18.—Without any delay the hearing in the Borel murder case was resumed this morning in the Fourth district court.

The defense offered a deposition made by J. O. Batchelder, proprietor of the Grand Hotel of Tulare, Cal., which set out that on November 10, Borel registered at the hotel named, went to his room, closed all means of ventilation and turned on the gas.

Deputy Marshal Hill told how Borel had attempted to get his case before the grand jury on Saturday, Feb. 24, the day before Lewis was killed; and of his subsequent actions, which were peculiar and unaccountable.

James L. Low, one of the defendant's attorneys, was placed upon the stand and gave his opinion that Borel was insane at least two days before he did the killing.

John J. Sullivan and C. L. Strevell, two members of the grand jury which was in session at the time of the killing of Lewis, testified to having seen Borel on Saturday, Feb. 25, after the jury had adjourned for the week, and both were of the opinion that he was mentally unbalanced.

Henry T. Snyder, night jailer at the city jail where Borel was detained as a witness from Nov. 28, 1892, to Feb. 25, 1893, stated that during all the time between the dates mentioned the defendant was very despondent and his manners were peculiar, and especially was this the case after two other snickers were returned by the Lewis gang, but got back their money.

William T. Greenwell had seen the defendant on the Saturday before the tragedy and thought he was either crazy or going crazy.

Joseph Baxter, jailer at the city jail, was the last witness called before the noon recess. He gave a brief account of the defendant's life at the city jail during the time the latter was detained there and freely expressed the opinion that Borel was a little "off."

The first witness called at the afternoon session was William Brown, who was sworn and testified to being a police officer. His testimony was to the effect that he had seen Borel in the Loan & Trust building the Saturday before the killing; that he was walking up and down the corridor with his hands in his pocket and would occasionally scratch his head.

William Marchant, a Twenty-fifth street lunch counter keeper was called and testified. He said that Borel came to his place to eat; that during the week before the killing he acted as though inebriated under great restraint. Borel explained about his head; on one occasion he wanted witness to kill him.

The next witness was James Kirk, a son-in-law of Marchant. His line of testimonies was like that of Marchant in many respects. Witness stated it as his opinion that Borel was crazy the week before the shooting, and that he (witness) was afraid of him.

Richard Rosebush was the next witness put on the stand. Kirk corroborated the testimony of Marchant. William Blosser testified to having seen the \$1,700 check which Borel lost in the possession of Lewis, but was not permitted to tell how he came to offer the check as part payment for an interest in witness' business.

Fred McInerney told how Borel had entered the city jail after the shooting with the revolver in his hand, and said: "It is ended." Defendant then took a vial from his pocket and, saying "Here goes," swallowed part of the contents.

The city council held a special session tonight and passed an ordinance granting an extension on the franchise of the Henderson-Bruker electric street railway. Three members of the council voted against the measure, giving as their reasons that they considered the enterprise a real estate scheme and it would never be carried out.
