

THE JUDICIAL GRIND.

Considerable Litigation Over the Attachment of a Horse.

The Salt Lake Loan and Building Association Wins Its Case—Heavy Cattle Attachments—Court Notes.

The argument in the case of the Salt Lake Building and Loan association vs. Mabel A. Johnson was concluded in Judge Bartch's division of the Third district court yesterday morning and the case reached the jury at 11:30 o'clock.

Twenty minutes later they returned into court with a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for the possession of the property in dispute and fixed the amount of damages for rents and profits at \$1,000.

CONTENDED ATTACHMENT CASE.

The next case called was that of Sorenson & Nelson against George Prece. The action was begun in Justice Hall's court and later was transferred to Commissioner Pratt, where it was heard. The plaintiff sued for \$108.30 and instituted attachment proceedings. The defendant filed an answer, admitting that he was indebted to the plaintiff in the amount demanded, but alleged that he was damaged by the suing out of the writ of attachment in the sum of \$250, and demanded judgment for that amount. The defendant also alleged that his store was mortgaged and that a horse and wagon seized under the writ of attachment was exempt. In the lower court the plaintiff demurred to the counter-claim and answer, and the same was sustained and judgment rendered in favor of the plaintiff for the full amount. The defendant then deposited \$250 in the lower court in lieu of a bond and appealed to the Third district court.

After the appeal the attachment was dissolved and leave given to amend the answer and counter-claim. They were amended and the defendant, instead of claiming that he was damaged in the sum of \$250 by the suing out of the attachment, demanded \$1,000. When the case was called yesterday, Mr. Ferguson argued a motion to dismiss the cross-complaint and counter-claim, on the ground that the case, being an appeal from a lower court, the appellate court could not take jurisdiction of any sum to exceed the jurisdiction of the court below.

Mr. Taitcock, for the defendant, brought in Clerk McMillin's docket, showing that the amendments were all made by the leave of the district court, and hence opposed the motion to dismiss.

After argument the motion was sustained and judgment entered in favor of the plaintiff on the pleadings.

OTHER BUSINESS.

F. E. McGurrin vs. John Beck et al.; demurrer withdrawn and ten days to answer.

Jack Bolton vs. Hyrum Grovesbeck; ten days additional time given to prepare statement on motion for a new trial. The accounts of District Attorney Judd, in the sum of \$215, and his assistant, Judge Howal, in the sum of \$125, were approved.

P. L. Schmidt vs. M. M. Kellough; motion for change of venue to the First district overruled and exception taken.

J. J. Montague vs. George McCarroll et al.; demurrer to cross-complaint argued and submitted.

Martha Ann Coombs vs. the Utah Patent & Oil company; judgment in favor of plaintiff by default.

CATTLE ATTACHMENTS.

Claims Against Lawrence Mariger Aggregating \$11,258.50.

Three attachments suits, aggregating \$11,258.50, were filed against Lawrence C. Mariger in the Third district court several days ago. It appears that Mariger purchased a large number of cattle from certain parties in southern Utah recently, through his agents, some of which was Mori Cantfield, who committed suicide some days ago. The cattle were delivered, but when payment was demanded Mariger attempted a "stand-off" and as the parties who delivered the cattle could not find the matter in that light they immediately began attachment proceedings.

The plaintiffs were Henry C. Matthews, who sued for \$3,833.10; James H. Hines and others; Henry Rice et al., for \$2,468.50; and Robert Francis for \$1,956.78; all alleged to be due for cattle sold and delivered.

A deputy marshal immediately went to Milford and levied upon 653 head of cattle belonging to Mariger, but two of the attachments have since been quashed and the cases are all in course of settlement now.

COURT CLEANINGS.

Many People Sued on All Sorts of Claims.

Dorothea Winer is suing D. E. Gleason in Justice Kesler's court for the possession of a desk, valued at \$30, with \$10 as damages.

G. W. Luvard alleges that Emma S. Woodruff et al. closed a ditch in Farmer's ward to his damage in the sum of \$200 and he demands damages against them for that sum in Justice Lochrie's court.

J. M. Higley & company have filed an action against Harry W. Nichols in Justice Lochrie's court to collect \$46.51, alleged to be due for merchandise.

Peter Jensen has begun suit against the Black Mountain Mining company in Justice Kesler's court to collect \$60 alleged to be due for a cow and calf.

Alex Nelson filed an action against Mrs. Joranson in Justice Kesler's court yesterday to collect the sum of \$30 alleged to be due as the balance of purchase price of a cow and calf.

In the case of J. G. Mead vs. the Gilson Asphaltum company, Justice Lochrie has rendered judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$21.62 by default.

L. M. Byers has begun attachment proceedings against Phoebe Sears in Justice Lochrie's court to collect \$200, money loaned.

In the case of J. S. Sharp vs. Mary V. Scott, Justice Geas has rendered judgment in favor of the plaintiff for \$75.

The Jurors Excused.

When the case of Sorenson & Wilson was disposed of before Judge Bartch yesterday afternoon his honor looked over at the tired jurors and said: "Gentlemen, you are now excused for the term. There will be no more jury trials until the second Monday in September, when the fall term of court begins. In the interval the judges will give their attention only to such cases as may be tried before the court and to the constantly increasing motions which have to be determined before the issues in a large number of cases are settled.

A REDUCTION IN RATES.

A One-Way Cut to St. Louis and Chicago—Railway Notes.

The recent passenger rate agreement entered into at Denver had led the public to believe that the rate question had been settled on a permanent basis, but a new reduction is announced before the agreement is two weeks old. The reduction is made necessary by the cut of the Great Northern from Portland to Missouri river points, St. Louis and Chicago. The new rates will go into effect next Sunday as follows: To the Missouri river the \$30 rate is unchanged; to St. Louis, reduced from \$38.50 to \$31; to Chicago, from \$39.35 to \$33.00.

BAGGED THEIR GAME.

The Deputies Made an Easy Catch of the Sheriff's Posse.

Sullivan, Donahoe and Greer Brought in, and Attorney Thackston Under Arrest—They Fly Hounds.

Deputy Marshals Cannon, Janney and Burt returned to the city yesterday morning, having in their custody Sheriff John T. Sullivan, T. J. Donahoe and H. P. Greer, who are charged with a contempt of court in refusing to allow the deputies to serve certain writs of attachment on the property of the Utah Milling company, twelve miles west of Eureka last Friday night, and of forcing the keepers at the point of a gun to vacate the premises. There is also an additional charge of contempt against Sullivan for refusing to turn the property over to the receiver.

The deputies arrived at the mill at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday night and, as the parties for whom they had warrants did not know Burt, he was delegated to go up the mill and ascertain the lay of the land.

Burt approached the door and knocked and Donahoe put in an appearance. Burt informed him that he had a warrant for his arrest and immediately gave himself up. Cannon and Janney then put in an appearance and a search was made for the other parties for whom the officers had warrants. H. P. Greer, however, was the only additional man found. He was at his home and quietly submitted to arrest when Cannon told him what was wanted.

Donahoe was asked where Scott and Sullivan were, but replied that he didn't know. As the deputies went through Eureka they were met by a host of hostilities, however, they left warrants for Sullivan, Scott and Attorney Thackston, with Deputy Marshal Paul, and the latter had Sullivan at the train when Cannon had his party returned. Thackston was out of the city and Scott was also missing, but advices have been received to the effect that Paul will arrive here this morning.

Donahoe was also being notified and will be here tomorrow.

At 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon Attorney Critchlow called the matter up before Judge Bartch. He made a statement of the matter as it now stands and insisted that it be taken up. The defendants and others, he said, were now in possession of the property and carrying on business and, desperate as they are, were liable to burn the property down. He thought the question as to whether the marshal or the sheriff should have the right of possession, should be decided at once.

Attorney Houtz of Provo, who will appear for the defendants, opposed the immediate hearing on the ground that he wanted to procure some witnesses and asked that the matter be set down for Saturday morning.

The case was set down for hearing at that time and in the interval counsel will go into active training for an interesting set-to on the date designated.

At a later hour the defendants went before Commissioner Norrell and gave bonds for their appearances, after which they were released from custody.

Attorney Thackston will probably be called upon to bear the brunt of the blame, as he strongly advised the sheriff not to give up the property under any circumstances.

Sheriff Sullivan's Statement.

Sheriff Sullivan, of Juab county, who was brought up here yesterday to answer to a charge of contempt for ousting United States deputy marshals from the Tintic mill by force of arms a few days ago, gives an account of the affair which differs materially from that given by Bowman Cannon. The sheriff says he left on the property on June 28, and it was not until two days later that the marshal appeared on the scene. On the night of the 30th, the sheriff was informed that other parties were at the mill, and he started for the place with one deputy. On the way he met Bowman Cannon on the track, and told the latter that his men would have to vacate. He then proceeded to the mill, and finding Joe Bush there, ordered him to vacate and notified him that he was under arrest.

"If there was any gun play preceding this," said Mr. Sullivan to a HERALD man, "I didn't see it. I did have my gun with me, but did not make any demonstration with it or threaten to use it, although, as the property was legally in my charge, I was prepared to hold it at all hazards."
