

THE COUNTY COURT.

Action Taken on the Joint Building Middle.

The Outing of Contractor Bowman Confirmed—Protest Against a Liquor License—List of Appropriations.

The county court met in regular session yesterday and transacted routine business as usual. Judge Blair presided and all members were present.

A NEW BRIDGE.

The clerk was instructed to give Road Supervisor Shurtliff, of district No. 4, an order on Caboon Bros. for 1,000 feet of bridge timber and forty pounds of spikes.

PROTEST AGAINST A LIQUOR LICENSE.

The application of Pender & Nowell for a retail liquor license at the corner of Twelfth South and Fifth East streets was granted and bond approved. In a petition to the court asking that favorable action be taken on the application and bond, the petitioners stated that two persons living near them objected to the granting of the license, but that they intended to keep an orderly house. Upon a vote to grant the application Judge Blair voted against it, but his colleagues were unanimously in favor of granting it and the motion to that effect carried by a three to one vote.

REPAIRS AT BIRMGHAM.

Thirty-two representative citizens of Birmingham and vicinity sent in a petition asking that the court redeem its promise in regard to making repairs upon the roads and bridges in that locality, and that immediate steps be taken to provide funds for the purposes named. It was further suggested that in the employment of labor heads of families be given the preference. The petition was filed and the clerk instructed to notify the road supervisor of that district to give the heads of families the preference on all road work.

Mrs. C. F. Whittemore asked for relief from an alleged illegal tax sale made by the collector to Salt Lake county in 1891.

Referred to the county attorney. The county attorney was instructed to file a written opinion with regard to the abatement of taxes.

The county physician reported patients in the city hospitals as follows:

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the action of the joint city and county building committee in terminating the employment of Mr. J. H. Bowman, the contractor, be ratified, and that it be the sense of this court that the said committee vigorously prosecute work on said building to the end that labor be employed and the building be completed, and that notice in this action be transmitted to the joint city and county building committee.

The clerk was instructed to give the county surveyor an order for a road record.

The sheriff reported that he had furnished 1,353 meals to county prisoners during the month of July. Filed.

LON TURNER KILLED.

Result of a Prize Fight in the City of Denver.

The Battle Was with William Robinson, Also Well Known in Salt Lake—How It Happened.

Lon Turner, known as the "Sailor Kid," the light-weight pugilist, who had such a desperate battle with Henry Williams at Ogden, last winter, died at Denver on Friday afternoon, from the effect of injuries received in a prize fight with William Robinson, a colored pugilist, which took place in that city on Thursday night. Turner came to Salt Lake from Montana last fall, and was at once taken in hand by local sports, who were pleased with his agility and hitting powers. He had several friendly bouts here, and finally took on Williams, the latter having the advantage of weight, height and reach. The fight took place in the Junction City, and was a long one, Williams finally winning. The principals and all connected with the affair were arrested, were afterwards discharged, and in May Turner left for Denver.

William Robinson, "the colored bantam," is also well known to Salt Lake sports, as he lived here for some time and trained Frank Richards for one of his fights. The two bruisers had a mill in Denver last May, but no particular harm was done, and the affair which ended in Turner's death was then arranged. From all accounts it would seem that the fight was a most brutal affair. The men were not in good condition and they made no attempt at scientific fighting. It was a slug-fest from beginning to end, and lasted twenty-two rounds, when Ed Masterson declared it a draw. After the decision Turner started to leave the elevated ring, and as he put his foot on the chair, he slipped from exhaustion and fell, his head striking the back of the chair. He became unconscious almost immediately and although water was thrown over him and the usual efforts made to revive him, they did not avail, and the man was taken to his room. The next morning a physician was called in, but he was unable to render any assistance and Turner died on Friday afternoon. In the evening an autopsy was held, and the result was announced as follows:

"The body much bruised; contusions were found over both eyes; and abrasion on left jaw near chin; marked abrasion on left knee. A lump was found over the left occipital bone; blood was found in the brain. The cause of death was congestion of meninges of the brain followed by effusion of blood caused by external violence." Several arrests have been made and the coroner commenced an inquest yesterday.

Dick Carberry, who seconded Turner, in speaking of the affair said: "I seconded Turner in the fight for two weeks. I was more surprised than when he became unconscious. It was not the fight that killed him. He could have fought for two hours longer. The blows he got didn't amount to anything. The blow was high, and when he was getting down he put his foot on a chair and slipped and fell off the chair, his head striking the back of it. He could not rise, and put his hand to the back of his head, and was hurt. It was that fall that killed him and not the punishment in the fight. He was a well-behaved, young fellow and trained for the fight for two weeks."

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IN THE LAND OFFICE.

The Decision in the Case of Kessler vs. Holt.

The case of Edward A. Kessler vs. Emma Holt, which was heard in the land office a few days ago, involving desert entry No. 1413 made July 11, 1855 for the south half of the southwest quarter of section 10, township 1 S., R. 1 W., was decided by the register and the receiver yesterday. The decision is that the entry be cancelled as the defendant has failed to do the required irrigation. Thirty days is allowed her in which to appeal.
