

UTAH DAY AT THE FAIR.

Special Train to Go from This City.

BUSINESS MEN ARE GOING.

An Excellent Plan for Advertising the Territory.

The Margetts Investment Company Incorporated Yesterday with a Capital of \$148,000—Lead Takes a Jump—Yesterday's Clearings.

Utah day at the World's fair will be a hummer.

Utah's sweet singers will be there, and Utah's solid business men will be there too.

A movement has been on foot for some days to organize a large party to go to Chicago for that occasion, and arrangements were completed yesterday for running a special palace train, with observation platform to the White City.

The train will reach Chicago on the afternoon of September 8, in ample time to allow the party to participate in the festivities on September 9.

The train will be run under the auspices of the Salt Lake Chamber of Commerce, and will go out over the Rio Grande Western, a rate of \$54.70 has been secured for the route, tickets good for thirty days.

The party will be in charge of W. E. Hubbard, president of the chamber of commerce, and C. O. Whittemore. They expect that a large number of representative men will make the trip and if it is possible for them to leave Mayor Baskin and Governor West will be among the party.

A large amount of advertising matter will be taken along and placed to the best advantage, and it is expected that the territory in general and Salt Lake in particular will receive much benefit from the excursion and the celebration of Utah day.

Articles of incorporation of the Margetts Investment company were yesterday filed in the office of the county clerk.

The capital stock is \$148,000, divided into 4,800 shares of the face value of \$30 each. The stock is taken as follows: Richard A. Margetts, Thomas B. Margetts, Harry S. Margetts, William G. Margetts, Frank E. Margetts and Sarah J. Pembroke 500 shares each.

H. S. Margetts is president; F. E. Margetts, vice-president; William G. Margetts, treasurer and secretary. The object of the incorporation is to conduct the business of buying and selling real estate within the territory of Utah. The principal offices are in Salt Lake city.

The company owns 120 acres of ground at the northwest corner of the southwest quarter of section 2, township 1 south, range 1, in Baena Vista addition.

To Keep a Buttonhole Fresh. Carnations, daisies and occasionally half blown rosebuds that have been worn as buttonholes in the evening may be carefully managed to keep fresh enough to wear again next day. A man in town who has a pardonable penchant for frequently wearing a buttonhole bouquet, yet does not wish to spend more than \$1.50 to \$2 a day on this luxurious fancy, put away his buttonholes at night as carefully as a woman does her jewels.
