

IN THE SUPREME COURT.

A Full Bench Renders a Number of Decisions.

THE NELSON EMBEZZLEMENT

L. Price Arrested for Shooting with Intent to Murder.

Third District Court Orders and Judgments.

The territorial supreme court convened at 10 o'clock yesterday morning with a full bench, consisting of Chief Justice Zane and Associate Justices Barth, Miner and Smith.

John H. Goldthwait vs. John T. Lynch et al.; petition for a rehearing denied.

Malicious Prosecution. Daniel Hamer, appellant, vs. First National Bank of Ogden, respondent.

Marshall Parsons. In the case of O. H. Pettit vs. E. H. Parsons, appellant, vs. E. H. Parsons, respondent.

Penalty on a Bond. Eugene W. Caughran and Nathan H. Cottrell, appellants, vs. Henry C. Rigelow and H. P. Henderson, respondents.

On a Promissory Note. James B. Russell, appellant, vs. Caleb R. Hank et al.; an action on a promissory note heard before Judge Miner and execution was taken to the decree entered therein.

Armstrong vs. Ogden City. In the case of J. C. Armstrong et al. appellants vs. Ogden et al., appeal from the Fourth district court.

Put off a Train. Rose and J. Durlow vs. the Union Pacific Railroad company, appellants. This was also an appeal from Judge Miner's court.

Prepares the County Jail. Judge O. R. Leonard, of Ogden, applied to the court for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Alfred H. Nelson, awaiting trial for embezzlement.

Whitmore Contempt. The George C. Whitmore habeas corpus matter was taken up on a return of writ and was argued at length by Attorney Vanan for the prosecution and Attorney Arthur Brown for the defense.

Charges Against Commissioners. In the matter of certain charges against John Combs and E. P. Johnson, supreme court commissioners, Joseph P. Sacher, clerk of the supreme court, was appointed to examine into said charges and to take testimony in the matter, and report to the court his findings in the premises.

Attorney B. H. Jones. In the matter of certain charges preferred against B. H. Jones, a member of the Ogden bar, by D. P. Tarpey, demurrer was filed and the case referred to Clerk of the Supreme Court Sacher to take testimony.

Minor Matters. In the case of Garland vs. the Bear Lake and River Waterworks and Irrigation

company et al., bond fixed at \$100,000 and cost bond at \$50.

Commissioners and Justices. H. H. Lenke, the young man charged with the grand larceny of a bicycle belonging to Sam C. Parker under circumstances already reported, was brought back from Cheyenne and arraigned before United States Commissioner Pratt yesterday.

Warrant issued yesterday by Commissioner Pratt on the complaint of Hy E. Higson for the arrest of L. Price for the alleged willful shooting with intent to murder Hugh Higson on August 25. Details of the occurrence have already been published.

Liberated on Bail. John Doe Smith, the man who has been in jail since July 31, held to await the action of the grand jury on the charge of arson, committed at Silver City, gave bond before United States Commissioner Pratt yesterday in the sum of \$1,000.

Suits Begun. The Harris Furniture Co. is suing J. M. Kennedy et al. in Justice Hall's court to collect the sum of \$25 on a promissory note.

Judgments were entered in the Third district court as follows: Robert Skinner vs. Thomas C. Patten, for the plaintiff for \$200.19; abstract from Justice Hall's court.

Orders were made in the Third district court yesterday as follows: Bang & Meyer vs. Berets & Doan; leave given to withdraw summons for additional service.

Suit Entered. The M. S. Aschmitt Mercantile company has commenced suit against Phillip Morgan to recover \$1,049.02 on two causes of account balances.

Probate Court. Orders were made yesterday in the probate court by Judge Blair as follows: Estate of Mary Ann Maxwell; hearing on petition of Mrs. M. M. Bird and Mrs. C. M. Berry concerning certain personal property came on, and by consent of counsel was continued to Thursday, Sept. 7, at 10 a. m., at which time petitions are to file a list of personal property claimed by them.

Court Notes. Judge Zane will hold a session of the Third district court tomorrow. The supreme court adjourned until September 23.

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
