THE RACES AT PROVO.

Views of Mr. Emise on the Tire Question.

Some Utah Centurians and Their Records.

Since the inception of the pneumatic tire the efforts of their makers have been directed to the perfection of a fabric which would stand to speed and comfort in the tire. The experiences of the past season have conclusively shown that the very properties of resiliency which tend to make a perfect riding road tire are the very elements which make it impossible to obtain top notch speed on such a tire, and vice versa.

THE PROVO RACES.

Those who witnessed the recent races at Provo were doubtless surprised at the large number of spectators. Surely wheeling is progressing at a rapid rate when such towns as Provo turn out from six to seven hundred people at a race meet.

UTAH'S CENTURIANS.

It isn't all wheelmen that are fond of hundred mile races, but Salt Lake city has quite a list of riders who have accomplished a century in the stipulated time of sixteen hours. The chief centurians are: C. A. Emise, appointed by the Century Road Club of America as the official who recognizes claims for centuries. If no record is kept and attested by responsible people at points along the route, it is not recognized and consequently not official.

GEARS USED BY FLYERS.

Zimmerman the wheeling wonder of the age finds an excellent gear, the H. K. Tyler also uses a 65, while Windel pushes a 63 and Sanger a 72 gear. The tendency of all great riders however, at the present time is toward a slightly lower gear. It has been found that such gears as 59 inches are not productive of as good results as from 63 to 70.

Cycling Behoos.

Johnson has lowered Windle's record of a mile flying start from 1:56 2/5 to 1:55 2/5. Horsemen have given up the idea of a tire ever equalling the wonderful speed of a bicycle.

Emise has pulled the Utah official record for a quarter mile down to 3:15. Charley pegs away at records with an instrumentally perfect machine of recreation piles up century runs to his credit and grows fat over such trifles.

Last week Lafferty attempted to lower the five mile track record at Utah, but failed to come anywhere near it. He had but two pace-makers, however, and had to do considerable of the distance without pacing. He will try again.

Our Colorado friends will have to keep their eyes open. Utah has already had them on the quarter mile record, 34 1/2 and to within 1/4 seconds of the mile and very close to the half mile. There is no question of our boys' ability to still pull them down a few paces.

Announcement of the Musical Public. The experience of the Choral society last year in its efforts to present complete oratorios was so satisfactory in every way, except in the matter of finances, that it has already another oratorio under rehearsal. Rossini's "Moses in Egypt." The chorus work is not nearly so heavy as that in "The Creation," the burden of the work coming upon the soloists.

Much as our people love music, they have hardly appreciated the beauties of oratorio. It should be encouraged, for it not only gives character to a city in the matter of elevating its musical societies, but it fosters orchestral music, and gives an opportunity to study the most sublime musical compositions.

An aid to the study of such works as a series of concerts has been mapped out by the management of the Choral society to be given in the First Congregational church at popular prices.

The programmes will consist of numbers for the chorus, the organ and vocal soloists, all under the direction of Professor Seymour. One night will be devoted to the Italian masters, another to the German and the American, etc. The series to be given under the euphonious title of "Evenings with the Great Masters."

Since the success at the World's fair by Professor Stephens' Tabernacle choir, the entire city should interest itself in the growth of the Choral society, composed as it is of members of all choirs, under the same competent director, and organized for the special purpose of giving complete works.

HE IS AN OYSTER KING.

A Runaway Boy of Fourteen Carves Out His Own Fortune.

"Jerry" Murphy has been found at last. His lonely father tramped the length of Long Island in search of him some time ago, but without success. "Jerry" had been found, but he is not the lad that his father expected to see, writes a New York correspondent of the Chicago Herald, and old Murphy is rather glad of it.

He started on his second tramp three weeks ago and walked as far as Sag Harbor when he heard of a boy, thought to be "Jerry," who had crossed Long Island sound to Connecticut. Murphy walked back to Williamsburg to raise the fare to New London, Conn. When the road out home the story of his tramp got into the newspapers. He received a letter the following Tuesday from Captain A. C. Hand of Good Ground, L. I., who stated that a boy answering the description of "Jerry" was at Good Ground and was known as James Egan. Jeremiah started to walk to Good Ground yesterday and said his heart was so light he was afraid he would blow away like a balloon.

"Yes," said he, "I've found 'Jerry.' I spent a year and a half looking for him, but I am well paid for the trouble. I will settle down now and get a job in my trade, because I know my job is in good hands and is prosperous. I reached Good Ground Friday noon and called on Mrs. Hand, who directed me to Sydney C. Bellows' boarding house, nearly a mile away and close to the bay. I saw Mr. Bellows and a boy turned out of a lane and got down the road about me. I hurried after them, and the boy,

who proved to be 'Jerry,' ran and waded out into the bay to avoid me. I ran to the beach and called out: 'So you're here, are you?' I don't know you," replied the boy. Then the man, who was Mr. Bellows, spoke to me and I told him I was looking for my son. 'I ain't your son,' shouted Jerry. 'Is your name Jim Dunn?' Jerry didn't answer, but stood out in the bay shivering and sulking, and so I said: 'Come here, Jerry, your mother and brother are dead, and you and I are all that are left on earth.' That touched his heart and he waded to shore, crying like a baby.

"I learnt from Mr. Bellows that 'Jerry' made a lot of money by doing chores for boarders; that he owned a three-acre oyster bed and had banked some money. 'Jerry'—God bless him—pointed to two oyster snucks at anchor and told me with pride that he owned them. 'I want to stay here, papa,' he said. 'I didn't like it at Fahy's farm and I started to walk home a year ago and was offered a job while passing through this village. I make lots of money in summer and go to school in winter. I go to Sunday school, too. Next summer my oysters will be big enough to send to market, and then I will have a pile of money. I'll write to you and you can write to me, but when you write put 'James Egan' on the envelope. That's my name now. The name 'Jim Dunn' is the boy oyster king. I like the name. ILLICIT CIGARETTES.

Chinese Manufacturers Caught and Once Arrested in San Francisco.

Internal Revenue Officers Thomas, Gilchrist and Jones raided a Chinese illicit cigarette factory at 805 Jackson street yesterday and arrested two operators, Kun Sing and Lee Hong, who were caught at work.

The cigarettes manufactured were of the abominable regular Chinese variety, twenty in a pack. There was also a large quantity of unstamped tobacco. The proprietor of the factory is Son Loy, an old offender, who has a store at 807 Jackson street. A warrant was procured for his arrest, and Kun Sing and Lee Hong were locked up. Over a year ago Son Loy was caught violating the laws and all his property was seized.

At this time 2,000 cigarettes were taken from the factory, the charge on which the warrant was issued against him was under section 3387, to-wit: Having in his possession, which is made a felony, and for which the penalties are a fine of from \$150 to \$1,000 and imprisonment for from six months to three years. If convicted he will be imprisoned for from three months to five years.

The charge against Kun Sing and Lee Hong is that of manufacturing, which is both a felony and a misdemeanor, the minimum penalties being less and the maximum ones greater, viz.: A fine of from \$100 to \$5,000 and imprisonment for from three months to five years.

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
