ADNER WILLIAMS WILL WALK OUT.

Utah Has Cause to Rejoice Over the Fact.

ROBERTSON AND GODFREY ALSO GO.

Result of the Recent Election in Salt Lake.

While it is disappointing to the Democrats in Congress, it will have no bad effect upon the passage of the Utah Statedhood Bill.

Washington, Jan. 5.—[Special].—Secretary Smith has called for the resignation of Mr. Williams, of Arkansas, member of the Utah commission, and also for the resignations of Robertson, of Indiana, and Godfrey, of Iowa, the two Republican members of the same commission.

It is understood that Secretary Smith will recommend the appointment of George W. Thatcher, of Logan, in place of Williams, and he will recommend the appointment of two Republican members from the territory.

Frank Harris will be nominated in a few days for receiver of public moneys at Salt Lake.

Mr. Isaiah will be appointed postmaster at Ogden, probably on Monday next. Changes will also be made at once in postmasters at Provo and Park City.

It will have no effect.

RECEIVER FOR THE MISSOURI PACIFIC.

New York, Jan. 5.—Suits has been instituted by the Evansville & Terre Haute against H. T. Nichols & Co. bankers, for \$310,000, all of which has been diverted from the treasury of the company, including \$89,000 loaned from President Mackey.

THE FRENCH MADE A MISTAKE.

London, Jan. 5.—A dispatch to the Times from Liverpool says Elder, Lemstedt & Co. have received a telegram to the following effect: "The French, by mistake, attacked the British expedition at Warina. Inspector-General Lendy was at one time supposed to be harmed in by the natives at Koranke and an expedition was sent in his relief. It appears the men attacked by the French were not under Lendy's command, but were really in charge of the recently organized frontier police."

THE DEADLOCK IN THE HOUSE.

But Little Prospect of It Being Broken.

POPULISTS REFUSE TO AID DEMOCRATS.

The Obstruction in the Path of the Tariff Debate.

Fillibustering Successfully Carried on for Four Hours, in Which the Republicans Received Substantial Aid from Democrats and Populists and Catchings Finally Moves an Adjournment, Which is Carried.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The power of the committee on rules was invoked today to break down the obstruction in the path of the tariff debate.

At least twenty Democrats at the capitol either absented themselves from the hall or refused to answer to their names when called.

For four hours the Democratic leaders tried with roll call after roll call to bring the men into line.

Today's proceedings are, therefore, of additional importance as marking the first time in the history of either branch of Congress since the organization of the third party, that its members have held the balance of power.

Willis' Instructions Would Prevent Any Such Action.

IS EXCITEMENT IN WASHINGTON.

Wild and Boundless Rumors Afloat in the House.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The Associated Press cable from Auckland, announcing that Minister Willis had notified the provisional government to retire, as the queen had agreed to grant amnesty, has been the absorbing topic in congressional circles today.

A New Scheme Worked by a Couple of Toughs.

COUGHLIN AND THE WHITE HORSE.

A New Witness Who Will Give Important Evidence.

An Alabamian Man Hanged for Killing His Wife—A Colored Man Stretches Hemp For Outraging a Young Girl—Two Pools Meet Death over a Love Affair—A Crank Who Tries to Collect From Gould.

Keokuk, Ia., Jan. 5.—J. H. Willis and J. A. Bell are held under \$5,000 bonds to appear before the federal grand jury on the charge of using the mails for fraudulent purposes.

The scheme worked by Willis and Bell was to enter into correspondence with the owners of patents pretending they had the offer of a farm to exchange for a patent.

THE COUGHLIN CASE.

A New Witness Who Saw the Defendant With the Wagon.

KENTUCKY TIE SOCIAL.

Bardtown, Ky., Jan. 5.—Phil Evans, colored, was hanged here this afternoon for the outrage and murder of the 13-year-old daughter of E. H. Hall, with whom Evans was on a drunk.

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Kansas City, Jan. 5.—Marlin Redd, colored, was hanged this morning for the murder of his wife in September, 1890, in a fit of jealousy, after which he made a nearly successful attempt at suicide.

TWO POOLS LEST.

Louisiana, Mo., Jan. 5.—William Hunter and William Punch, rivals, fought. Hunter shot Punch dead and then blew out his own brains.

TO COLLECT FROM GOULD.

New York, Jan. 5.—P. C. Chich, lately released from an insane asylum, went to Lakewood, N. J., to see Gould, but he refused to collect \$100,000 he said Gould had promised him.

AN ALABAMIAN HANGED.

Tuscaloosa, Ala., Jan. 5.—Will Farmer was hanged here at noon for the murder of his wife last August in a fit of jealous anger.

HOYT BADLY INJURED.

Beatrice, Neb., Jan. 5.—While crossing the street last night with his wife, who is a sister of President Cleveland, W. E. Hoyt was run into by a buggy and knocked senseless. He remains in a semi-conscious state, though the physician believes he will recover. He is seriously injured about the head.

FORTY THOUSAND DOLLAR FIRE.

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Jan. 5.—A fire broke out in the business portion of the little town of Corwith this morning. It is still raging, threatening complete destruction. The loss is already \$40,000.

BIG FIRE AT WORCESTER.
